Attorney Moss Cited.—Rule Requiring Him to Answer to Charges of Contempt. Proceedings alleging contempt of court were begun in the United States branch of the Police Court this morning against Attorney John A. Moss, colored. After the filing of numerous affidavits in the matter by Assistant District Attorney Ralph Given, Judge Kimball issued an order to the attorney requiring him to show cause why he should not be punished for the offense alleged. The order was served by Deputy Marshal Lacey, and was made returnable March 9, at 11:30 a.m. The incident has created a stir in court and the outcome of the matter will be watched with interest.

Two New Cases.—New Sources Develop in the Spread of Smallpox. Two cases of smallpox have been entered on the health office records since the Star's report of a new possible food for spread of the disease. The latest case reported was that of Henry M. Browning, twenty-two years old, of 1004 C street northeast, who has been sick in his home for two weeks and is now in the Metropolitan Life Insurance Hospital. Careful examination for "chickpox" by the health office inspectors that convinced the health office members of the danger to seven other members of the household, Browning refused to go to the smallpox hospital, and all are with him under quarantine in the C street house at the center of infection.

CHAFFEE LEAVES THE NAVY.—The Midshipman Desires to Accept Civil Employment. The Secretary of the Navy has accepted the resignation of Midshipman Earl W. Chaffee of Wisconsin in order that he may accept civil employment. Chaffee was one of the three midshipmen dismissed three years ago for having and returned to the Academy by special act of Congress. Like Midshipman Lofland, Chaffee said that he felt he was unsuited for the navy. The only one of the trio still in the service is Midshipman Joseph D. Little, now attached to the Columbia.

MR. LARRINAGA'S APPEAL.—Urges the Retention of the Porto Rican Regiment. During the discussion of the army appropriation bill in the House of Representatives yesterday afternoon Mr. Larrinaga, resident commissioner of Porto Rico, made his first speech in the House. He opposed the abolition of the Porto Rican regiment. Mr. Larrinaga was listened to with attention, and at the expiration of the five minutes allowed under the rule was granted an extension of time by the courtesy of the House.

Attorney Moss Cited.—Rule Requiring Him to Answer to Charges of Contempt. Proceedings alleging contempt of court were begun in the United States branch of the Police Court this morning against Attorney John A. Moss, colored. After the filing of numerous affidavits in the matter by Assistant District Attorney Ralph Given, Judge Kimball issued an order to the attorney requiring him to show cause why he should not be punished for the offense alleged.
