

ANNAPOLIS PROGRAM

TRANSFER OF REMAINS OF JOHN PAUL JONES. Ceremony to Be Held in the Naval Academy Grounds April 24—The President to Speak.

Secretary Bonaparte, who has been at his home in Baltimore for several days past, resumed his official duties at the Navy Department this morning. He has made a large and notable company an added attraction to the program to be observed at Annapolis April 24 at the exercises in commemoration of John Paul Jones, whose body is to be removed on that day from its present resting place to Bancroft Hall, where it will remain pending the completion of the memorial chapel.

President Roosevelt, Secretary Bonaparte and other distinguished officials from Washington will go to Annapolis by a special train over the Baltimore and Ohio railroad. Carriages will be in waiting at the station, and the President will be taken to the dwelling of Admiral Sands, in the Naval Academy grounds. Luncheon will be served to about seventy-five or one hundred guests, who will include the President and his party, the Secretary of the Navy, the French ambassador and the French admirals, Admiral Dewey, Gov. Warfield and others.

Exercises in the Army. The exercises are to open in the armory at 2 o'clock. In addition to the midshipmen, there will be room in the armory for about 400 persons, and it is expected that every available seat will be occupied. The demand for invitations has been tremendous, and it has been found impossible to accommodate all who desire to be present. No tickets will be given for admission into the grounds of the academy, and the only restrictions will be within the armory, admission to which will be by ticket.

On the program in the armory will be only six persons—President Roosevelt, the French ambassador, Secretary Bonaparte, Admiral Sands, Horace Porter, and Gov. Warfield. There are to be four speeches—each by President Roosevelt, Gen. Porter, the French ambassador and Gov. Warfield.

Transfer of the Remains. It is expected that the exercises in the armory will close about 4 o'clock, and the remaining ceremonies will be brief. The body of Jones will be taken out of the brick vault in which it now rests, placed upon a hearse and conveyed to Bancroft Hall, where a place has been provided for it. Following the burial will be President Roosevelt, Secretary Bonaparte, French ambassador, Gov. Warfield, Gen. Porter and the admirals of the French and American fleets. Behind the distinguished group will follow the entire body of midshipmen of the Naval Academy.

When the procession reaches Bancroft Hall, Dr. Clark will read the prayer at the Academy, will offer a prayer and pronounce the benediction. This will close the exercises.
