

The case of Barbara Pope, colored, charged with violating the "Jim Crow" law, will be called for hearing in the court house of Alexandria county before Judge Nicol Saturday next. It is said that the case will be made a test. It is the outcome of the woman being fined \$10 by Mayor Hawhurst of Falls Church for alleged violation of the law.

The woman claims to be a clerk in the interstate commerce commission, Washington, and was a passenger on a train of the Southern Railway Company when the alleged violation of the law occurred.
