NEW YORK, October 22.—Lieutenant General Nelson A. Miles, U. S. A. (retired), arrived from Europe today on the steamer Minnetonka.

THE SUPREME COURT

CAUSES OF MORE THAN USUAL INTEREST.

The Supreme Court of the United States today refused to assume jurisdiction in the contempt case of Mayor Ross of Kansas City, Kan. A fine of \$1,000 was imposed by the supreme court of Kansas for assuming office as mayor after he had been deposed on a charge of failure to enforce the liquor laws of the state. The effect of the court's action will be to leave the sentence of the state court in effect.

The Virginia "Fertilizer Trust" cases were advanced on the docket and a hearing set for December 3 next. The cases are in the nature of habeas corpus proceedings.

A hearing on the case of the Virginia versus West Virginia, involving the debt contracted by Virginia before its partition was fixed by the Supreme Court of the United States, was held today.

Solicitor General Hoyt entered a motion to advance the argument in the case of the Union Bridge Company, versus the United States, involving the right of the company to maintain a bridge over the Allegheny river at Pittsburgh, in violation of an act of Congress, which forbids the building of War to require the alteration of bridges over navigable streams so as to render navigation easy. The case involves the question whether Congress has the right to delegate to the Secretary of War the power to determine what is an unreasonable obstruction to navigation, and is considered important because of its general application.

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CAMPAIGN IS LIVELY

WEST VIRGINIANS BEATING THE BUSHES FOR VOTES.

Special Correspondence of The Star. WHEELING, W. Va., October 20, 1906. A number of speakers have been imported from the east to speak at the meeting in the national phase of the election, and it is significant that they are unlimbering there mostly in republican counties. Senator Scott, who has taken to the stump, furnishes one of the reasons. He declares that the magic of Roosevelt's name and performances is just as potent as years ago, if the voters can be aroused. It is all in the arousing, he says.

Nevertheless, the "trailing" attention on something else beside the development of the idea of transplanting and mentioned in a case in which a child of four years suffering from cretinism had a portion of its mother's thyroid gland transplanted into its spleen. After nine months the child was beginning to develop the physical characteristics of a normal person. He narrated a number of successful experiments in transplanting the blood vessels of animals. He had, he said, succeeded in removing blood vessels six centimeters (2 1/2 inches) long, not only from live animals, but from animals which had been dead a long time.

While it was not possible to remove and transplant large blood vessels from living human beings, yet blood vessels could be suitably taken from freshly amputated limbs. Such transplanting would be of great use in many cases in modern surgery, for instance, when in removing the big long and thin arteries of the leg, which often results fatally for the parts of the body fed by these blood vessels.

WEATHER FORECAST.

Weather conditions and general forecast.—The tropical disturbance has about disappeared over southern Florida and the western coast of Mexico, and the pressure over Mexico. Pressure is high generally over northern districts from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

The weather continues cloudy and rainy in Atlantic coast districts, and rain has set in in the lower lake region. In Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Dakota, Nebraska, Nebraska, Kansas, northern New Mexico, northern Arizona and over the Texas Panhandle snow has fallen, the fall in the middle Rocky mountains, and in portions of North Dakota and Nebraska being especially heavy for the season.

Light rain, with occasional rain in indicated for Atlantic coast districts and the lower lake region, with little change in temperature. Low temperatures are probable in the lower Mississippi valley and east gulf states.

The winds along the middle and south Atlantic coast will be fresh northeast to north; the east gulf light to fresh northerly, and on the lower lakes fresh and variable, mostly northeasterly.

The following midnight precipitations (in inches) has been reported during the past twenty-four hours: Santa Fe, 1.02; Atlantic City, 1.48.

The following twenty-four hours ending 8 a. m. Sunday: Providence, 3.10; Hartford, 2.52; Charleston, 1.14; Atlantic City, 1.40.

At 11 a. m. Sunday, the European ports will have fresh northeast winds, followed by fair weather to the Grand Banks.
