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AMONG BUSINESS MEN

DISCUSSION OF COMING BOARD OF TRADE MEETING.

Activity of New Element and the Purposes in View—Election of Directors.

An uppermost topic of discussion in business circles today was the business to come before the annual meeting of the Board of Trade, to be held Monday evening in the board rooms in The Star building.

Perhaps the greatest interest, owing to the fact that prominent names have been placed in nomination as candidates for the ten vacancies that will soon occur.

There are said to be two distinct tickets in the field, one containing the names of the ten present directors whose terms are about to expire, and a ticket containing the names of three of the old directors and seven gentlemen who are not members of the directorate.

The first ticket is understood to represent the conservative element of the board, which has for years controlled its destinies along the lines marked out in the present by-laws and regulations of the organization.

Platform of New Element. For many years the board has proceeded along lines looking to the general improvement of the District and the betterment of all conditions, without specializing any particular interest.

Business men generally concede that the board has proved to be a power in bringing about better conditions and increased improvements and in standing pat for the rights of the citizens of the District in every event.

It is said these views will be embodied in a report that will be submitted to the board at its meeting Monday night. It is the expectation that a large majority of the four hundred members of the association will attend the meeting, which promises, with the officers' reports and other business, to be a most important one.
