

WILSON STATE Honored in Building Where He Signed the Declaration. THRONGS PASS HIS BIER Will Be Buried Beside His Wife's Remains

IN OLD CHRIST CHURCH YARD Attorney General Moody One of the Speakers at the Memorial Exercises in Philadelphia.

PHILADELPHIA, November 22.—In the historic building where, 130 years ago, he signed the great document that gave life to a new nation, the body of James Wilson, which was removed from North Carolina to this city for interment in the burial ground of Christ Church, lay in state for several hours today, while a steady stream of people filed past the bier and paid a final tribute prior to laying the remains in the tomb where rest those of his wife. The body of the great patriot arrived here shortly before 11 o'clock on board the United States guest ship Dubuque, which conveyed the remains from Norfolk. It was to have arrived yesterday, but, owing to a dense fog, the gunboat was delayed in its journey up the Delaware bay and river.

After the body had been transferred to a hearse it was escorted to Independence Hall, which was draped in mourning. The funeral ceremony was held at the residence of the late Mr. Wilson, where the body was placed on a table in the side of the room stood the dais upon which John Hancock, President of the Continental Congress, and George Washington, president of the constitutional convention, had sat.

It took only a few minutes to arrange the room and place the casket in the coffin and then the door was thrown open to the public.

This afternoon the remains of the great jurist were conveyed to the burial grounds of Christ Church, in which Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Wilson himself and other notables of revolutionary times were buried.

Notable Gathering. In the presence of a distinguished company, which included a member of President Roosevelt's cabinet, Justices Fuller, Day, Holmes and White of the United States Supreme Court, the governor of Pennsylvania and other citizens, the body of James Wilson, one of the great figures in the American revolution, which lay in a North Carolina casket, was today placed by the side of that of his wife in the burial ground of historic Christ Church. The ceremonies attending the reinterment were simple but impressive, and were conducted according to the rites of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

The body of the great patriot was disinterred from its grave at Easton, N. C., Tuesday and was conveyed to this city in the gunboat Dubuque, which arrived here today before noon. Prior to the services at the residence of the late Mr. Wilson, where thousands of persons filed past the bier, the body was escorted from Independence Hall to the residence of the late Mr. Wilson, where it was placed in a casket of Philadelphia caviary and several justices of the United States Supreme Court, of which tribunal Wilson was one of the first members, acted as honorary pallbearers. On the way to the church, the procession passed the grave of Benjamin Franklin, where it halted and stood in silence for a moment.

Services in Church. The exercises at the church were conducted by the Rt. Rev. Alexander Mackay-Smith, bishop coadjutor of the diocese of Pennsylvania, assisted by the Rev. R. Heber Barnes, rector of Christ Church. Following the services for the dead, tributes to the patriot were delivered by Samuel Dickson, chairman of the new commission of Philadelphia, for the bar of Pennsylvania; Gov. Pennypacker, for the people of Pennsylvania; Dean William Draper Lewis, for the University of Pennsylvania; Judge Alton B. Parker, for the American bar; Andrew Carnegie, as lord rector of St. Andrew's University, for Scotch-Americans; Wilson having been a native of Scotland; Dr. S. J. May, for the American literature; Justice White, for the Supreme Court of the United States; Attorney General Moody, for the American people; and Attorney General Hampton L. Carson of Pennsylvania, who delivered the oration.

Following the oration, the committal services took place in the churchyard, which were followed by the unveiling of a tablet to the memory of Wilson and his wife.

Mr. Moody's Tribute. Attorney General Moody was the principal speaker at the memorial service. In the course of his remarks he declared: "We are joining today in an act of long-delayed justice. The occasion is full of interest for every lover of liberty, for every believer in a strong and efficient government, capable of furnishing protection to the rights of its citizens entrusted to its care, of compelling obedience to its laws, and of fulfilling its obligations to the other nations of the earth—of interest, because we are commemorating the life of a man who, as much as any other, has made it possible for us to live in security under a government."

"When I read for the first time Madison's report of the debates in the convention which framed our Constitution, I made my real acquaintance with James Wilson. I learned that this man had exercised an influence in the convention which equaled, if it did not surpass, that of any other man. It is one of the mysteries of history that his fame has not kept pace with his service. By his speeches and writings he prepared the way for the independence, which, as a sign of the American nation, as a member of the congress under the confederation, he struggled as best he could, with the feeble government set up by that instrument."

Believer in Democracy. "Recognizing that the ultimate sovereignty rested with the people of the United States, he desired a government whose powers should proceed directly from them and operate directly upon them. He realized the inestimable value of the preservation of the state and the nation, alike, as the creation of the people and subject to the people's will. He would have had the President elected by the people, the members of the legislative bodies elected by the people divided into equal constituencies. He was a believer in democracy, in national government—the first man, I believe, in all our history who united the two beliefs. He was not troubled with the apprehensions which haunted the men of his time, as they have haunted the minds of some men from that day to this. Liberty and property would be insecure under a strong government controlled by the people. He had faith in their intelligence and sense of justice. He understood clearly that government is necessarily a matter of well-devised constitutions and well-expressed laws, but that in the end good government is possible to a people only when they themselves wish, demand, and by their virtues, deserve it."

"With the keen vision of a seer he discerned that the structure of the government was destined for the ages for vast territories and uncounted millions. We may imagine his picturing to himself the restless progress over the mountains and rivers and arid plains until the sons of fathers looked out upon the waters of the Pacific. The prospect did not inspire him with the fog of the timid ones who could see nothing but danger beyond the boundary of their state or section. If the in-

Believer in Democracy. "Recognizing that the ultimate sovereignty rested with the people of the United States, he desired a government whose powers should proceed directly from them and operate directly upon them. He realized the inestimable value of the preservation of the state and the nation, alike, as the creation of the people and subject to the people's will. He would have had the President elected by the people, the members of the legislative bodies elected by the people divided into equal constituencies. He was a believer in democracy, in national government—the first man, I believe, in all our history who united the two beliefs. He was not troubled with the apprehensions which haunted the men of his time, as they have haunted the minds of some men from that day to this. Liberty and property would be insecure under a strong government controlled by the people. He had faith in their intelligence and sense of justice. He understood clearly that government is necessarily a matter of well-devised constitutions and well-expressed laws, but that in the end good government is possible to a people only when they themselves wish, demand, and by their virtues, deserve it."
