NO FURTHER ACTION

War Department Statement as to Colored Troops.

AN INQUIRY BY CONGRESS

Secretary Taft Has Not Considered Its Probability.

DISCHARGE NOT DISBANDMENT

Battalion Must Be Retained Except by

Special Legislation—Recruitment Difficult.

It is said at the War Department that no further action will be taken in the case of the discharge of the 170 members of the 25th Infantry unless specifically directed by the President, and it is not expected that he will have anything more to say on the subject until after he reaches this city next Monday or Tuesday.

In answer to a direct inquiry on the subject, Secretary Taft said he had not seriously considered the probability of a congressional investigation of the matter.

"But there is one thing I have learned that Congress can do," he said, laughingly. "I can investigate. I know that from experience, for Congress has investigated everything I have ever had anything to do with."

A dispatch has been received at the War Department from Major Penrose, commanding the 25th Infantry at Fort Reno, saying that the order for the discharge of the troops under the President's original order had been received and was being executed. He said the men were being mustered out at the rate of twenty-five a day, and that the mustering out would be completed by Monday.

No definite information can be obtained at the War Department regarding the report that an exception to the President's blanket discharge order has been made in the case of about ten members of the three companies concerned, that some are actually absent from Brownsville at the time of the affair. Some of these men rejoined the companies soon after, and may have heard of negro applicants, but it is not believed that they might have given a possible clue to the identity of the guilty parties.

Cannot Be Disbanded.

It is said at the War Department that the three companies form part of the regular establishment of the army, and cannot be disbanded except by special legislation. An effort will therefore be made to fill the vacancies caused by discharges by regular recruitment, but army officers freely admit that it will be a long time before the required complement can be secured.

All recruits who are accepted are a hard matter to secure good material for the army at \$13 a month, and that it will take time and trouble to recruit suitable substitutes for the seasoned veterans who have been discharged. It is a melancholy fact that most white Americans are unwilling to accept of a soldier's life in time of peace and also that the recruitment of foreigners is on the increase. Heretofore there has been an over supply of negro applicants, but it is not believed that that condition will now continue, except, possibly, among the undesirable classes.

The recruitment of the 1st Battalion of the 25th Infantry will be conducted by the company officers, as otherwise they would have to perform the duties of these companies as now composed wholly of officers, and upon them will devolve the important duty of filling the ranks.

Will Appeal to President.

When President Roosevelt reaches Washington he will be urged by influential politicians, prominent negroes and representatives of white organizations, to reconsider the case of the negro soldiers. The War Department continues to receive protests from all sections of the country. Friends of the soldiers have already taken steps to have Congress investigate the case.

Preparing to Take Action.

A press dispatch from New York says that lawyers representing the Constitution League are now in the west taking testimony in an endeavor to establish the exact facts regarding the discharge of the soldiers. There is little doubt that the league will seek legal recourse looking toward reinstatement of the discharged soldiers.

A New York dispatch also says that arrangements have been completed by citizens of New York and Philadelphia for bringing east the three companies as soon as their discharge papers have been signed. They will be clothed and cared for by committees selected for the purpose, and plans have been so arranged that any citizen who is interested in the case and who desires to hear the story of the case will have access to the men.

THE TINGEY TABLET.

Memorial to Man Who Laid Out Washington Navy Yard.

A bronze tablet has been placed on the commandant's house at the navy yard in memory of Capt. Theobald Tingeby, U. S. N., who laid out the yard in 1800, and from that date was its commandant until his death there in 1829. Capt. Tingeby, who was very popular with the citizens of Washington, may fitly be styled "The Father of the Washington Navy Yard."

The unveiling will take place Wednesday, the 28th instant, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon. The exercises will be simple, consisting of a brief address by Hon. W. H. Hackett, ex-assistant secretary of the navy, to be followed by remarks from Secretary Bonaparte. No special invitations have been sent out, but the public generally will be welcomed. It is expected that army and navy officers, members of the Oldest Inhabitants' Association, of the various patriotic societies of the Columbia Historical Society, and all persons who are interested in the navy yard and its associations, or in the early history of Washington, will take the opportunity to be present.

PERMANENT ORGANIZATION.

Jobbers and Shippers to Hold Meeting This Evening.

Arrangements have been made for a meeting of the board of directors of the Jobbers and Shippers' Association to be held at 8 o'clock this evening in the library of the American Security and Trust Company. It is said the matters to be considered by the board will include arrangements for selecting permanent officers of the organization, putting the association on a permanent basis and mapping out plans for next year's work.
