RACES AT NEW ORLEANS

NEW YORK, December 8.—Although John I. Taylor of the Boston Americans talked matters over with Frank Farrell, the owner of the New York Americans, yesterday, no agreement was reached as to the probable exchange of players between the two clubs. In fact it looks now as if the proposed deal by which James Collins was to be exchanged for Mortality and Delahanty had fallen through. Farrell said yesterday that he did not believe Collins would ever be able to play his best game again and that as the New York club was well fixed for third basemen with Conroy, Laporte and Mortality he felt like standing pat. There may be a deal, however, by which Pitcher Dineen of Boston will play for Jack Chesbro going to the Hub. President Taylor is willing to trade Dineen for Chesbro even up, but the New York officials are not ready to talk business just now. Connie Mack of the Philadelphia Americans is expected to talk with Taylor for today, looking for the exchange of Collins to the Quaker team in exchange for a couple of pitchers. Mack has thirty-six players on his list, and is willing to deal with anybody.

Unless President Ebbebt of the Brooklyn base ball club changes his present plans he will sell first baseman Jordan and Right Fielder Lumley to the New York National League club for \$25,000 cash. This offer was made to Ebbebt by the latter several days ago and was told that in all probability the New York club's offer would be accepted. HIGH-PRICED MINOR LEAGUERS FOR CLEVELAND

TURF AND TRACK NOTES.
