RESIDENT OF DISTRICT FOR MORE THAN HALF CENTURY.

The death of Mr. John G. Bright, a resident of the District of Columbia for more than fifty years, occurred yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock after an illness of several months, the result of a complication of diseases, in the seventy-first year of his age.

Mr. Bright was born in Germany in 1836, came to the United States when thirteen years of age, and resided in Baltimore for several years. He then came to this city. During the civil war Mr. Bright served with the troops defending this city and was also employed in the construction of forts in the District.
