

SERVICE FOR THE DEAD

Last Rites Tomorrow Over Consul Roosevelt's Remains.

WITH GRAND ARMY HONORS

The Interment to Be Made at Oak Hill Cemetery.

MASONIC QUARTET TO SING

President Roosevelt the Heir to a Trophy, a Civil War Medal of Honor.

In connection with the death of Capt. George W. Roosevelt, late United States consul, it develops that President Roosevelt has fallen heir to a trophy that is without price—a medal of honor of the civil war which was purchased with blood on the field of battle by Capt. Roosevelt, his relative.

It is recorded in history that he dashed into the confederate line at Gettysburg and recaptured and saved his regimental colors. In the performance of this brave act he lost his leg. Before his death Capt. Roosevelt directed that the trophy of valor be given to his next of kin, Col. Theodore Roosevelt, the commander of the Rough Riders in the war with Spain. It is said the presentation will be made by the wife of



Capt. George W. Roosevelt. The deceased soon after the obsequies. Mrs. Roosevelt may be accompanied on the occasion of the presentation by prominent officers of the Grand Army of the Republic, of which Capt. Roosevelt was an honored member.

Funeral Arrangements. The funeral of Capt. Roosevelt will take place tomorrow afternoon from W. R. Spear's undertaking establishment, 940 F street. The cortege will start from there at 1:15 o'clock, and proceed to Oak Hill cemetery, where the services and interment will take place at 2 o'clock. The arrangements are in the hands of Capt. A. A. Maxim, past commander of Gen. George G. Meade Post, No. 5, G. A. R., Calvin Farnsworth, past department commander; Col. Alexander Scott and other officers of the Department of the Potomac, G. A. R. In the chapel at Oak Hill the impressive services will be conducted by Capt. Maxim and Henry S. Stevens, chaplain, and by Rev. G. Davenport of Emmanuel Episcopal Church of Anacostia. A feature of the services will be the rendition of appropriate airs by the Masonic quartet, consisting of Messrs. Alexander Mosher, first tenor; William D. McFarland, second tenor; J. Henry Kaiser, first bass, and J. Walter Humphries, second bass.

A firing party of marines from the navy bugler will volley over the grave, and a lone bugler will sound "taps"—"lights out." The honorary pallbearers will be Department Commander Newton Ferree of the Department of the Potomac, G. A. R.; Col. Farnsworth, past department commander; Col. Arthur Hendricks and Col. Emmet Urell of the Medal of Honor Legion; Col. Alexander Scott and Major Henry Romeyn. Capt. George W. Roosevelt was born in Chester, Delaware county, Pa., February 14, 1861. He enlisted April 16, 1861, in Company K, 20th Regular Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, and was one of the very first to answer to the call to arms. He was wounded at Fair Oaks, Va., May 31, 1862, and was in every engagement in which his regiment took part until he lost his leg at Gettysburg. At that time he was first sergeant, commanding his company. He was afterward awarded the Medal of Honor by Gov. Geary of Pennsylvania for gallantry on the field of battle.

In Foreign Service. Capt. Roosevelt has served his country abroad continuously since 1878. He was appointed United States consul at Auckland by President Hayes. He afterward served as consul at St. Helena, Matanzas and Bordeaux, in which latter city he remained eight years. He was transferred in 1880 to Brussels, where he served as consul general until his death on April 14. For continuous service he was made consul general. He received his consular medal of honor, as stated, for most conspicuous gallantry at the second battle of Bull Run and at Gettysburg. His wife was Miss Ida Edmonston.

Becomes Member of G. A. R. Col. Calvin Farnsworth today related to a Star reporter the circumstances attending the entry of Capt. Roosevelt into the Grand Army of the Republic in this city in the fall of 1888. He called upon Col. Farnsworth at the Treasury Department and expressed his desire to become a member of the patriotic organization, and gave as his preference Gen. George G. Meade Post, No. 5. Capt. Roosevelt said he was under immediate orders from the Department of State to sail for his diplomatic post at Bordeaux, France, and therefore could not wait for the regular meeting night of the post to roll around. If he was to become a member of the Grand Army it must be accomplished at once.

Col. Farnsworth went to the office of Gen. W. S. Rosecrans, then secretary of the treasury, and requested his permission to occupy an unoccupied room in the Treasury Department building. He then opened a meeting room for the purpose of a muster. Capt. Roosevelt into the organization. Gen. Rosecrans gave the permission and Col. Farnsworth said the building and got together a number of members of the several posts of the G. A. R. including Past Department Commander Arthur Hendricks, who took an important part in the mustering-in ceremony that followed. Capt. Roosevelt a full-fledged member of the city of Washington and was worth pinned upon the breast of the recruit his own G. A. R. badge and gave him his bronze button also, and that afternoon Capt. Roosevelt started on his journey to his post in France.

A Wild Flower Garden. It will be a sad thing for this year, as one result of an early spring, for amateur flower gardeners to plant for the admiration of their well-tended gardens of wild flowers, transplanted from the woods. Many of the plants found in the woods and fields have foliage and flowers as beautiful as the highly cultivated kinds. With the first touch of spring, before the snow and ice have disappeared from the more densely shaded places, the first wild flowers begin to bloom, and there is a constant succession of gay blossoms, increasing in splendor until late in September, when many of the wild flowers are at their best.

By making trips to the woods at various seasons, the flower lover may transplant such specimens of each variety as please his fancy. At home a bed should be prepared for them, placed where the plants may have some protection from the hot sun, and be watered regularly. The soil should be thoroughly enriched with well-rotted manure, or some commercial fertilizer. It is best to plant the wild flowers as a border, with all varieties mixed, as most of them are perennials, and it will be unnecessary to replant the border yearly, except to replace those that die. Owing to the different flowering seasons of the various varieties, if the bed is well furnished with many sorts there will be constant succession of bloom all the summer. It is best to begin working the ground for the bed as soon in the spring as it is dry enough. The transplanted flowers should be carefully and regularly watered until they are well established. Afterward it is only necessary to keep the weeds out. The seeds of many

of the best wild flowers can be purchased of the seedman.

Vines for the Veranda. Every possessor of a house with a porch, whether in city, suburb or country, should realize the opportunity he has, with the help of nature, to make it a delicious and beautiful, cool, green, shady retreat in summer. In winter it matters little what it is. Vines will transform any porch into a bower. To have vigorous vines plenty of rich soil is needed, and it is best to insure this by adding plenty of cow manure or bone meal to make it rich. Good drainage, as in any flower garden, is also essential. In the woods many wild vines may be found. There are the Dutchman's pipe, the wild

grape, the moon seed vine, the trumpet vine and others. The wild grape vine is especially useful and easily obtained. Its luxuriant foliage, rapid growth and delightful fragrance make it useful for summer houses and similar structures. The trumpet vine with its scarlet orange flowers is very easily grown, not at all sensitive to rough treatment. It is found in many parts of the country wild. These vines may all be obtained also from dealers.

The silk vine is very fine, with dark green, luxuriant foliage of neat habit. It belongs to the milk weed family of plants and derives its name from the silky contents of its seed pods. It is excellent for the veranda, and is used to cover many famous old ruins.

A number of the climatises are well worthy of a place on the most beautiful veranda, especially the flowering varieties such as Clematis Jackmanni, which has purple flowers, and Clematis Henryi, which has white flowers, both producing a mass of rich color when in bloom.
