WILL SUCCEED PETTUS

EX-GOV. JOHNSTON TO BE ELECTED TO THE SENATE. Former Gov. Joseph E. Johnston of Birmingham, Ala., will succeed to the seat in the Senate made vacant by the death of Senator Pettus. Ex-Gov. Johnston was elected a second alternate last year when Senators Morgan and Pettus were renominated. Representative Bankhead was chosen as first alternate, and he has already been elected by the legislature to succeed the late Senator Morgan.

Mr. Johnston hails from North Carolina, having been born in Lincoln county, that state, in 1842, and is, consequently, sixty-four years of age. He is attending school when the civil war broke out, but immediately left his books and enlisted. He served with distinction from 1861 to 1865, was four times wounded, and rose from private to captain. From 1866 to 1884 he practiced law at Selma, Ala., but since the war he has been in the banking business. He was president of the Alabama National Bank from 1884 to 1894, and was the first president of the Sloss Iron and Steel Company. He was governor of Alabama from 1896 to 1900.

NEW RAILWAY OUTLET

EXTENSION LINE TO CONNECT WITH OLD DOMINION. Special Correspondence to The Star. BERKSDON, Va., July 29, 1907. Positive information has been received here that work on a railway line recently surveyed to connect with the Old Dominion at Great Falls is being pushed with vigor at the upper end. Indications are that the work of grading fifteen miles of the road leading from Hagerstown, Md., to Great Falls will be completed in a few months.

It is understood that when completed this extension will conform to the present line of the Old Dominion in the use of electricity as the motive power, but the present constructive work is being so thoroughly done that comparatively slight changes will be required to adapt the entire system to the heavy traffic of a steam road.

It was stated a few days ago by one who is well informed of the inside facts that the work being done between Hagerstown and Great Falls means ultimately the entrance of the Washington Railway into Washington city. It was not intimated that this would follow immediately after the completion of the Washington extension, but double tracking that part of the line, and changes in grades and bridge construction on the main line being first necessary, but the trustees of the Washington Railway are making necessary changes made from time to time.

It is understood that the plan contemplates a bridge across the Potomac at Great Falls and the use of the old canal bed, on the Maryland side, which is now owned by the Wash. road.

Quiet work is being done by those who are interested with Maj. Charles Hine and others of Vienna, in the construction of a branch of the Old Dominion road from Vienna by way of Vienna. It is reported that a survey has been completed parallel with the main line, and that the Hunte-Carter tract of right of way has been secured to that point and through the "Dunn tract" and Whipple property on the south side of the Potomac, to the city of Alexandria. Some grading work has also been done.

General and Personal. J. W. Keppart and S. A. Hersperger of Herndon are building several houses at Livingston Heights, on the Great Falls railway.

Dr. Paul Richmond of the 6th auditor's office, Treasury Department, has returned to Vienna after a short visit to Ashbury Park, N. J. He will remain at Ashbury Park for several weeks, when they will return to Vienna for the remainder of the summer. Dr. Richmond has sold his home on Lindley Heights, Vienna, to Ralph Lewis.

Additional suits have been filed at the circuit court, including the suit against the Washington, Arlington and Falls Church railway, on account of the wreck on that road July 3. The suits were by A. L. Cross and others against the railroad company, and by same name. Mr. Cross is represented by Attorney W. G. Collins of Vienna, and Mr. Chapman by R. E. Thornton of Fairfax.

Progress Reported. Railway Representatives Seeking to Eliminate Objectionable Smoke. At a recent meeting of the committee of representatives of the various railroads for the prevention of smoke in the District of Columbia reports were heard from each member upon the results so far obtained.

Mr. C. S. Gaskill, assistant engineer of the Pennsylvania railroad, was chairman. The other members of the committee were: Mr. Gaskill, general superintendent of the Pennsylvania railroad; Mr. F. J. Walsh of the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad; Mr. Richmond, Va.; Mr. Frank Linticum, of the railroad; Mr. E. A. Foss, Baltimore and Ohio railroad.

Mr. Gaskill, the chairman, reported that since the last meeting the smoke inspectors had reported that the smoke from the engine of twenty-two engines making light gray smoke, thirty-six cases of dark gray and thirty-one cases of black smoke. On the Southern railroad, six cases of light gray, fifteen cases of dark gray and sixteen cases of black smoke. One case of light gray and one case of dark gray had been reported against the Richmond and Potomac railroad, and one of dark gray against the Baltimore and Ohio. He stated that this report showed an improvement on all the roads and that most of the cases of gray smoke were due to slipping and starting the trains.

The chairman also stated that the coke used in the engine of the Pennsylvania railroad had since been furnished with a better quality of coke, but that better quality of coke, but that some of the men of the Pennsylvania railroad were slipping their engines, and that some of the cases caused by the fires not being properly prepared.

Mr. Gaskill of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad reported progress with regard to the elimination of smoke and stated that there had been less number of cases reported since the last meeting. He took and low volatile coal was being used on the shifrs operating around the station and yards with good results.

Mr. Thayer reported that conditions have improved on the Southern railroad since the last meeting. He said that of 1,200 engines which have passed out of this city the great majority of the cases of gray smoke reported. The meeting then adjourned until next month.
