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

PASSES 80TH MILESTONE

Three Local Swiss Societies Unite in the Festivities.

ADDRESSES IN CONGRATULATION

Function Takes Place at Volta Bureau, of Which Mr. Hitz Is Superintendent.

A resident of Washington, for a longer period than 's embraced in the allotted span of man, has reached the eightieth birthday of his life.

The function was held in the main hall and reading room of the bureau, which was appropriately decorated with entwined Swiss and American flags, and with flowers.

Native of Switzerland.

John Hitz was born in Davos, Switzerland, and he was brought to this country in a general immigration of the Hitz clan in 1831.

Mr. Hitz was president of the German Relief Society in the District of Columbia during the civil war, and several years ago he held the post until 1882.


