

HAYES SENTENCED TO PRISON

FIVE YEARS' CONFINEMENT FOR FORMER BANK TELLER.

Justice Gould Announces That He

Accords Prisoner Lowest Penalty Allowed.

Thomas G. Hayes, former receiving teller of the American National Bank, convicted last Tuesday of embezzlement and misappropriation of the funds of the bank, was sentenced today by Justice Gould in Criminal Court No. 1 to serve five years in the penitentiary. Hayes will go to Fort Leavenworth prison tomorrow with about ten other prisoners, who go to serve terms of more than two years.

No motion for a new trial was filed by attorneys H. E. Davis and H. Winship Wheatley, representing Hayes, nor did they make an appeal.

Hayes declared he had nothing to say when called on by Justice Gould before passing sentence. He bore the ordeal stoically, although his chin quivered somewhat when the court mentioned five years as the term of imprisonment. Justice Gould made no comment on the case beyond telling Hayes that he would accord him the minimum penalty provided by the statute.

WEATHER FORECAST.

Partly Cloudy Tonight and Tuesday, With Southerly Winds.

For the District of Columbia, partly cloudy and warmer tonight, Tuesday, partly cloudy; moderate southerly winds.

Maximum temperature past twenty-four hours, 67; a year ago, 65.

Low pressure over the interior and high over the southeast has resulted in abnormally high temperatures in central valleys and the plains states, but without precipitation. In the Rocky mountains and the extreme southwest the reaction from the low pressure is accompanied by snow and decidedly lower temperatures. In the east and south the weather is high temperature, with moderate winds.

The weather will be partly cloudy tonight and Tuesday in the east and south, with probably unsettled, showery conditions in the lower lake region and New York.

It will be warmer in the middle Atlantic states tonight and cooler Tuesday in the western lower lake region, the upper Ohio valley and the northern portions of the east gulf states.

The winds along the middle Atlantic coast will moderate to brisk east to south; in the south Atlantic and east gulf coasts, moderate to brisk south to southwest.

Steamers departing today for European ports will have moderate to brisk east to southeast winds with partly cloudy weather to the Grand Banks.

COL. ABBOT DOUBTS REPORT

ALLEGED SETTLING OF BATTERIES IN FORT STEVENS.

Statements Published in Portland Regarding Stability of Ground at Mouth of Columbia River.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 5.—The Oregonian today says that notwithstanding the denials that have been made regarding the sinking of portions of Fort Stevens, the report will not down. Following the statement made Saturday that only one of the batteries had sunk a few inches, another is that the sinking is much more general than at first announced, and that it prevails throughout the whole peninsula. Later reports have it that some of the buildings are settling to such an extent that cracks are forming in the masonry and foundations. It is alleged that in the vicinity of Ft. Stevens the Astoria and Columbia River railroad has been compelled to raise its grade in order to be above high water; that it has been necessary to place in position on the jetty a greater amount of material than called for in the engineers' specifications; that at Warrenton it has been necessary to increase the height of dikes to prevent inundation, and that the proposed fire-control tower has been delayed in construction to permit more exact information to be gathered regarding the alleged subsidence.

Doubted by Col. Abbot.

Col. Abbot, acting chief of engineers, said today in answer to an inquiry on the subject that no information has reached that office of any defects in the batteries at Fort Stevens at the mouth of the Columbia river. For that reason he was not prepared to accept as accurate the newspaper report that the land on which the battery is located is sinking with disastrous consequences to the fortification works. Col. Abbot said he was satisfied that there is nothing the matter with Fort Stevens, and that the sinking reported to the office without delay. He made an inspection of the batteries at Fort Stevens himself not a long time ago and found them in excellent condition. There was no evidence whatever of condensation. In fact, in Col. Abbot's opinion, the Fort Stevens battery is one of the driest in the country.
