Keeping Hands White.

If I were to be asked the one sovereign key of keeping the hands white in warm weather, I would say wearing leather or kid gloves, and I mean it, despite the fact of knowing the average girl will say "bother!" But you cannot expose the skin to warm winds and warmer sun without paying for it either by burning or freckling, and once this glove habit is contracted it will cease to seem a nuisance. It is a mistake to think that all gloves are heating. If chamois gloves, either white or yellow, a half a size too large,

are worn enough air will penetrate to prevent the skin from heating, and at the same time the hands will be protected and even be glowing finer. In point of fact, the more a girl will wear gloves, the better she will be. In all household work, while standing at night they soften and refine the skin, when worn at night they do not cause discomfort, but rather they have been punched through the palms for ventilation. An external application nightly undoubtedly improves the texture of the skin, and one of the best happens also to be in powder form. It is made by thoroughly moistening with sweet almond oil and then as much French chalk, powder, as can be worn to adhere to it, for some time, but will come off easily in warm, fresh water, with soap.

THE MODERN FIGURE

How to Regain Beauty of Form

The vagaries of Fashion are a great trial to ladies inclined to overeatness, but it is a good mistake to go in for physical repression in the shape of special diets. Fasting and violent exercising are also dangerous. One very soon becomes thin, depressed and sallow of complexion when such methods of getting thin are adopted. There is absolutely no necessity to study dieties or deprive one's self of wholesome rest and bodily comforts. The following is a prescription which will restore beauty of form without any sacrifice of strength. Any diet that will make it necessary to eat less than the body requires is injurious to the system and the reduction of weight occasions no wrinkles. The skin and complexion are rebeautified.

When the backs of hands are freckled they may be rubbed well at night with a cream made of one dram each of citrine ointment and sweet almond oil, six drams of spermaceti ointment and three drops of rose essence. It is better that a chemist should mix this, as no metal should touch it, and an amateur is not apt to have proper utensils. To use, it is rubbed in thoroughly after which gloves are worn. It may also be used during the day if the skin is to be protected by bathing. Going in bathing gives opportunity for the sunlight to injure the hands, for covered, they can be worn to adhere to. Protection may be given by copious applications of grease, using vaseline or cold cream, filling the nails as well as the arms. Over the grease is rubbed powder of magnesia, so thick as to make a paste, then more grease is put on, ending with a dusting of powder, making a finish not unsightly. This will stand the action of salt water for some time, but will come off easily in warm, fresh water, with soap.

THE BRITISH CRISIS

LONDON, July 17.—The liquor trade is a powerful factor in British politics, and the present struggle for supremacy between the house of commons and the house of lords "the trade" is fighting with the peers and against the people. It is the liquor trade which the Asquith government must fear even more than the landlords and the church, because the present government cannot live without the support of the Irish nationalists, and in Ireland the nationalists are not in sympathy with the liberal policy of restraining the traffic in alcoholic liquors. The controverted Lloyd George budget was the first effective blow dealt in the warfare against the liquor business in Great Britain. The house of lords had rejected the liberal licensing bill of 1908, and recourse was had to the power of taxation. In Great Britain the annual finance bill or budget goes into effect on the first day of January. The budget of 1909, or about one-third of the existing licenses, would have been terminated. In the first year of the operation of the new liquor laws the British people spent \$805,000,000 for alcoholic liquors, a decrease of \$20,000,000 as compared with the previous year.

The British people drink more liquor per capita than any other people on earth, except the French.

The annual per capita consumption of spirits, wines and beers in the United Kingdom is 23 1/2 gallons, as against 23 1/2 gallons for France, 20 1/2 gallons for Germany and 14 1/2 gallons for the United States.

How difficult it is to deal with this vexing problem in England is made manifest by the story of the liquor trade in the United States.
