The Department of Law was established in 1865, and is the oldest school of law in the city of Washington. It is the only school in the District of Columbia belonging to the Association of American Law Schools, and the only one of the District which is registered with the New York State Education Department as of sufficient standing to comply with the order of the Court of Appeals relating to admission to the bar.

### COURSES OF INSTRUCTION

I. **THREE-YEAR DAY COURSE** of twelve hours per week, leading to the degree of LL. B., with the privilege of taking a maximum of fifteen hours, and with most of the lectures given between the hours of 9 a.m. and 12 m.

II. **THREE-YEAR AFTERNOON COURSE** of twelve hours per week, leading to the degree of LL. B. (lecture hours, 4:50-6:30 p.m.). A new course designed to enable students who are employed to secure the LL. B. degree in three years. Students not desiring to carry the full course may extend the time of study without additional cost.

III. **GRADUATE COURSE** of ten hours per week, leading to the degree of LL. M.

IV. **GRADUATE COURSE** leading to the degree of Master of Patent Law (M. P. L.).

The above courses are intended to give a scientific as well as practical preparation for the practice of law in any state of the Union. (During the last several years the graduates of this Law School have taken the bar examination in seventeen states, and, as far as known, only two failed to pass at the first trial.) The substantive law courses are taught by professional teachers, devoting their whole time to the work, while the adjective law courses are conducted by members of the bench and bar of the District. The courses relating to Practice are emphasized and supplemented by a highly developed system of Moot Courts.

### ADMISSION

Applicants for admission must be at least eighteen years of age and have had a preliminary training equivalent to a four years' high school course.

### TUITION FEES

Tuition fees are based upon the number of hours taken per week, i. e., at the rate of \$10 per year for each hour taken per week, for the courses leading to the degrees of LL. B. and LL. M. The tuition fee for the course in Patent Law is \$40. Tuition fees are payable quarterly in advance.
