CITY PUMPS ARE MISSED

OLDEST INHABITANTS ASK THAT THEY BE RESTORED.

Testimony as to Their Safety for Drinking Purposes—Cost of Janitor Services Debated.

The advisability of restoring the city pumps of Washington was discussed at a meeting of the Association of the Oldest Inhabitants at the old Union engine house last evening. Practically all members present favored a resolution urging the Commissioners to replace the pumps removed about two years ago for fear that well water contains typhoid fever germs.

Safety of Well Water.

"The pumps were removed," he said, "because of fear of typhoid germs. But there is today as much typhoid fever in the District as there was when many residents of the city were drinking well water."

TRACING PELLAGRA'S SOURCE.

Belief of Physicians of the Public Health Service. Word has been received at the marine hospital laboratory that Dr. C. H. Lavinder of the public health service, who has been in Europe studying pellagra, has left for this country. He has had a hard but interesting summer's work. He is very conservative and careful in making predictions, so that he has not ventured any additional suggestions as to the source of pellagra, but it is believed by the physicians of the laboratory that there is no truth in the statement that the scientists are tracing hookworm in pastures and condensed milk. No work in this line has been done, and the circumstances are not such as to justify spending time in looking for what does not exist.

COURT DISMISSES RULE.

VIRGINIA SCHOOLS TO OPEN.

Large Increase in Attendance in Alexandria County. The public schools of Alexandria county, Va., will open Monday, September 19, for a ten-month session. The new school buildings at Clarendon and Cherryls will be occupied the first day of the session.

There has been considerable increase in attendance at the schools during the last five years. At the recent annual meeting of the county school board the figures for the 1910 school census were submitted to the division superintendent of schools by the three district clerks, as follows: Arlington district, 1,824, an increase of 625 over the census of 1905; Jefferson district, 762, an increase of 222; Washington district, 490, an increase of 146. The total increase for the county was 1,453.

During the seven months from July 31, 1909, to June 30, 1910, Alexandria county spent for schools \$47,233.66, a considerable amount of this sum went for new buildings.

AUGUST BUILDING PERMITS.

Operations Estimated at \$1,275,721. Are Authorized. Building permits covering operations to the extent of \$1,275,721 were issued by the building inspector in the month of August, according to a report sent to Capt. E. M. Markham, assistant engineer commissioner today.

Repairs to brick dwellings amounted to \$17,826. Brick dwellings were authorized to the extent of \$310,450. One office building started during the month is to cost \$125,000.

The distribution of the improvements in various sections of the District were as follows: Northeast, \$34,000; southeast, \$21,800; southwest, \$7,900; northwest, \$87,000; center, \$812,450. Repairs amounted to \$210,881.

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
