## NEW YORK, November 26.

Just one week's encounter with the bustle and rush of American life made such an impression on Lord Fisher of Kiliverstone, G. G. 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# AMERICANS LEAVANT

## DOING A GREAT WORK

Assistant Secretary Wilson Pays Tribute to Their Moral and Intellectual Influence.

## Huntington Wilson, assistant secretary of state, who has returned after a two-month trip abroad, during which he visited eight European countries, and executed a special mission to Constantinople, yesterday remarked upon the absence of commercialism on the part of Americans in the Balkan states.

Notwithstanding the fact that the conception of Americans in foreign lands is usually associated with business, he said their influence in the Balkan countries is almost wholly intellectual and moral through the medium of the American schools. He paid a tribute to these institutions, and said they were doing splendid work, especially in Turkey, imparting to their students with the idea and ideals of American civilization.

## Mr. Wilson delivered to the Sultan of Turkey a personal message from President Taft, which was in the nature of a greeting of friendship and of the extend of the Turkish government in sending an Ottoman mission to Washington last week.
