### TWO COMMITTEES MEET; EACH CLAIMS TO BE 'IT'

Two committees, each asserting its legality as the regularly constituted Balingier-Pinchot investigating committee, met yesterday to take up the report to be submitted to Congress.

The republican members met for the third consecutive day in the offices of Senator Nelson, chairman of the committee. The democratic members, with Representative Madison of Kansas, the republican who joined in making public report last September, met at the same time in the offices which the committee occupied during the hearings last winter.

#### Without a Quorum.

The democratic members adjourned after a short session. They said their meeting had been held in accordance with the adjournment they took September 9, in Minneapolis. As a quorum had not appeared, however, no business could be transacted.

#### Three Reports Probable.

At such a meeting the democrats will take the position that the report they made public in April was the authorized report of the committee. The republican members will have their own report to present at that time, as will Representative Madison.

### JAIL FOR PERJURER

Otto Linaweaver Got Married Under Another Name.

#### SENTENCED TO SIXTY DAYS

Charged With Swearing to False Statements in License.

#### ELOPES WITH VIRGINIA GIRL

Father of Young Woman, Pursuing Couple to Rockville, Finds He Is Too Late.

Special Correspondence of The Star. ROCKVILLE, Md., December 3, 1910. For swearing falsely in making application for a marriage license here several weeks ago, Otto Linaweaver of Manassas, Va., and Washington was convicted of perjury in the circuit court here this afternoon and sentenced to sixty days in jail.

Linaweaver was married in Rockville October 29, under the name of Owen Lamonta, to Miss Lephia Buchanan, daughter of Armenia C. Buchanan, a well-to-do citizen of Craigsville, Va. He had made his appearance in Craigsville only about ten days before, and did business as a clairvoyant or palmist. While in the Virginia town he attended revival services at the Methodist Church, conducted himself in an exemplary manner, and was received into some of the best homes of the town.

From the start he was attentive to Miss Buchanan and visited at her home. The two disappeared one morning, and immediately afterward Mr. Buchanan learned some things, it is said, that he did not regard as complimentary to the young man, who he started out in an effort to prevent, if possible, the marriage.

#### Swears Out Warrant.

Mr. Buchanan traced the couple to Rockville, where he learned they had been married a day or two before. While here he discovered that the couple were still in Rockville, they having engaged board for a week in a private family.

Mr. Buchanan, who had previously learned that Linaweaver had been married under the name of Lamonta, went before a justice of the peace and swore out a warrant charging the young man with perjury. Linaweaver was unable to furnish bail in the amount of \$1,000 and was committed to jail. Mr. Buchanan took his daughter back home immediately after the arrest of Linaweaver.

The indictment against Linaweaver charged that he swore falsely in giving his name, age and place of residence, and in saying he had never been divorced. Linaweaver, however, testified that he had adopted the name of Lamonta and that he lived in Boston, the place given by him as his place of residence; insisted that he was married in Washington, D. C., and denied that he swore he had not been divorced. The jury, however, promptly returned a verdict of guilty.

#### Divorced Wife Testifies.

In passing sentence, Judge Peter said that Linaweaver could have obtained the license had he given true answers to the questions asked by the clerk. He caused Linaweaver to witness perjury by stating that the maximum penalty for perjury was ten years in the penitentiary, but a moment later made the prisoner smile broadly by announcing that sixty days in jail would about fit the offense.

Among the witnesses for the state was Mrs. Nellie Linaweaver of Washington, the prisoner's divorced wife. She was before her marriage to Linaweaver, which took place in Rockville in July, 1907. Her maiden name was Virginia. Linaweaver was defended by Attorney Alexander Kilgour, and State's Attorney Bowie F. Waters conducted the prosecution. Linaweaver's father, who lives at Manassas, Va., was in court during the trial.

#### Linaweaver was a resident of Washington for several years, practicing clairvoyance. He was convicted in this city of failure to support his child, Ruth Linaweaver, and was sentenced to a term of ninety days in the workhouse. Following his release about October 1, he left the city and nothing was heard of him here until his arrest at Rockville. His wife, Mrs. Nellie Linaweaver, to whom he was married in Montgomery county, Md., July 3, 1907, filed proceedings for a divorce against him, which was granted by Justice Barnard May 9 last.



### TO UNVEIL STATUE

Miss Helen Taft to Officiate at Steuben Ceremony.

SELECTED BY COMMISSION

Exercises Scheduled to Take Place Wednesday Next.

PARADE PRECEDES ADDRESSES

President Taft, the German Ambassador and Other Distinguished Orators to Speak.

Miss Helen Taft, the President's daughter, will formally unveil the bronze statue of Maj. Gen. Von Steuben, inspector general of the American revolutionary army, erected in Lafayette Park by direction of congress, on the occasion of its dedication next Wednesday afternoon. Arrangements to that effect were made yesterday by Col. Spencer Cosby, engineer officer in charge of public buildings and grounds, who is executive officer of the Von Steuben statue commission.

Imposing military and civic ceremonies will mark the dedication of the statue. The Secretary of War will preside over the exercises and addresses will be made by President Taft, Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador; Representative Richard Bartholdt of Missouri, and Charles A. Hexamer, president of the National German-American Alliance. Patriotic songs will be rendered by the United States Marine Band. Rev. Charles F. Steck, D. D., will pronounce the invocation, and Rev. William T. Russell, D. D., the benediction.

Battery to Fire Salute.

When the statue is unveiled a battery of the 3d Field Artillery, stationed in the White Lot, will fire a major general's salute of thirteen guns. At the conclusion of the exercises at the statue, the President will review the parading column composed of all the regular soldiers and marines in this vicinity, a battalion of the District National Guard and about 8,000 members of various German-American societies from various parts of the country. Maj. Gen. William H. Carter of the general staff of the army will be grand marshal of the procession, and will be assisted by Maj. Henry T. Allen, 5th United States Cavalry, as chief of staff, and Capt. Joseph P. Tracy, Coast Artillery Corps, as adjutant general.

Formation of Divisions.

The first division will be formed on Pennsylvania avenue, facing south, at 17th street northwest. The marshal of the second division will form his division in the vicinity of 6th street, on Louisiana avenue, and at 2 o'clock proceed west on Pennsylvania avenue. When the head of his column reaches 14th street, the command will be halted and formed in a line facing south along the north curbing so as to allow the first division to pass. At the proper time the second division will take up the line of march, following the first division at a proper distance, at 14th street and Pennsylvania avenue. The Northeastern Singers' Association will proceed direct from its headquarters in time to participate in the ceremonies at the statue. At their conclusion it will proceed to Madison place and Pennsylvania avenue and join the parade at that place.

### FOSS GIVES HIS REASONS FOR OPPOSITION TO LODGE

Says Governor of State Should Be Interpreter of the People's Will.

WAREHAM, Mass., December 3.—In a speech delivered here today at the close of his three-day speaking tour of Cape Cod, Gov.-elect Eugene N. Foss explained his reason for taking the stump to oppose the re-election of United States Senator Henry Cabot Lodge. He said that his action in appealing to the people direct was not without precedent, and he instanced the success in this direction of Gov. Hughes of New York. He added: "A governor should be the interpreter and the representative of the popular will, and in going over this state calling the people together and discussing with them the question of the return to the United States Senate of Henry Cabot Lodge, who has allied himself with the great protected interests, who has legislated for them as against the people, as shown by the official records of his votes, I am doing no revolutionary thing."

### GIVEN TO SHERIFF'S CUSTODY.

Former Officials of the Illinois Central Accused of Fraud.

CHICAGO, December 3.—Judge Chetlain today remanded into the custody of the sheriff of Cook county Frank B. Harriman, John M. Taylor and Charles M. Ewing, former officials of the Illinois Central railroad, who were accused by that road of having defrauded it out of more than a million dollars by padded and illegal car repair bills. Upon indictment by the county grand jury the defendants sought to terminate the case by habeas corpus proceedings before Judge Chetlain, who today denied the petition.
