FOUR MORE OFFICERS

President to Fill Two Hundred Army Vacancies.

SYSTEM OF PROMOTION

Appointees Will Take Places of Those Who Are Now on Detached Service.

As a result of legislation enacted at the last session of Congress the President will be enabled to fill two hundred vacancies in the line of the army caused by the absence of that number of officers on detached service. This is possible by a regulated system of promotions in accordance with law. There are at present 728 officers employed on detached service. Of that number, seventy are required to complete the army organization; 232 are engaged as instructors at military educational institutions; 243 are employed in internal administration, such as recruiting, and as military attaches and aids to general officers, and 122 are on details away from the army. Included in the last mentioned number are sixty-four officers with educational institutions, twenty-five with the isthmian canal commission, sixteen with the Philippine government, five with the organized militia and four with the District government.

Of the entire number, however, only two hundred are affected by the legislation of the recent Congress. The list is distributed among the several grades from first lieutenant to colonel, inclusive, as follows: 77 first lieutenants, 79 captains, 27 majors, 9 lieutenant colonels and 8 colonels. The number in each grade has been distributed among the cavalry, artillery and infantry, in proportion to the commissioned strength of each branch.
