Case of Stupidity. "I have no doubt that Mr. Perkins' statement on the night of the 22d distinctly emphasized the run on the Trust Company of America, if, indeed, it did not precipitate it. I do not mean by this that I think there was the slightest purpose on the part of Mr. Perkins to injure you or the Trust Company of America. But he felt that it was his duty to be judicious that we did not send it out. Later, when I said to Perkins that I thought it was very hurriedly justified on the ground that the condition was so strained that if public attention had been centered on the Trust Company of America, every bank in New York probably would have been involved. I think that was a mistake, for which you had to pay a heavy penalty, but I do not for a moment think that there was any malice involved in it."

Favors Elliott Elliott. "Giving Elliott desk room in your committee room, with free use of the records before your committee at times when the committee are not present, and permitting him to withdraw from the committee room official documents submitted in evidence, and in this and many other ways to confuse and invalidate the evidence, is a gross and deliberate attempt to influence the committee in its deliberations in response to the resolution passed by the committee. Elliott has been made a party to this, and he has been made a party to it in his own headquarters, to cut and mutilate them at his discretion, and to write his personal comments on them."

Stone Asks a Hearing. At the outset of today's session Chairman Stanley of the committee read a telegram from Melville E. Stone, general manager of the Associated Press, requesting a hearing. He will be heard when the committee resumes after the recess. Mr. Stone's telegram to Mr. Stanley, read: "ALBANY, N. Y., August 11. "Hon. A. O. Stanley, Washington, D. C.: "Have just learned that a personal letter of Melville E. Stone, general manager of the Associated Press, was introduced in evidence today. It is only fair to say that this letter was written under the impression that it was a misapprehension of the facts and its use before your committee without explanation is unjust. I, therefore, request a hearing at once."

Committee Is Accused. "There is still another feature of this investigation which I take exception to. I am referring to the inquiry which it is necessary for the purpose in hand, and by what authority, you publish on the back of the title page of each of the printed hearings before the committee a resolution of the House as the basis for the investigation. The reported House resolution, as published, contains certain unambiguous recitals that the Department of Commerce and Labor is very willing to supply in full to the committee, but the fact remains that the House of Representatives, by expressing its opinion, has taken a position certain to cause you to insist on retaining it."

Had Nagel's Approval. "I admitted most of it," he replied. "I have examined the letter and I have given the approval of Secretary of Commerce and Labor Nagel, so far as it related to the facts."

Started Run on Bank. Oakleigh Thorne, president of the New York Trust Company of America, which became involved in the financial panic of 1907, the affairs of which have been linked with the taking over of the Tennessee Coal and Iron Company by the United States Steel Corporation in that crisis, followed George W. Perkins yesterday as a witness before the House committee of inquiry into the affairs of the steel corporation.

Requires Unanimous Consent. "Without the unanimous consent of the Senate, no motion to override the President's veto could be voted upon at this time," said Senator Smith today. "A motion to pass the bill over the President's veto is debatable, and the senators who are conscientiously opposed to the provision of the Arizona constitution which provides for the recall of the judiciary are entitled to debate it. The opportunities for a filibuster on a resolution proposing to pass the bill over the presidential veto appear unlimited, therefore, not only the opponents of the bill, but the friends of the bill, are entitled to debate the matter until doomsday."

DAK FOR MEN THE CONDITION

Clouds Threaten to Mar Chicago Aviation Meet. MANY EXPERTS ON HAND Thirty-Five Flyers Ready to Participate in International Contest. EXPECT TO BREAK RECORDS Every Known Kind of Machine Has Chance to Share in \$80,000 Prize.

Shade Trees in City Almost Clear of Pests. BUT LITTLE COST INCURRED Supt. Lanham Gratiated Over Success of Treatment. CHANGE MADE IN SPECIES Silverleaf Maples Abandoned. Norway Maples and Red Oaks Increased—Other Varieties.

CHICAGO, August 12.—A dark, dismal morning, with frequent thunder-showers, threatened to mar the opening of the international aviation meet this afternoon. In spite of the assurances by the weather bureau that nine days of fair weather and clear skies were due, the present outlook is that but few flights can be made before tomorrow.

The nearly 100,000 trees in the District of Columbia are in better condition than they have been in twenty-five years; that the tussock moth and the caterpillar practically have disappeared, and that this generally satisfactory state of affairs has been brought about at a less cost than amounts spent in previous years, will be features of the annual report to be submitted shortly to the Commission on the part of the District superintendent of trees and parks.

All Kinds Given Chance. The program was framed to give every known kind of flying machine an equal chance at the prizes, whether it was built for endurance, stability, lifting power or ease of control.

Silverleaf Maples Discarded. It was learned today that the department had abandoned the planting of silver leaf maples, and that this species is destined to become extinct. Norway maples, it is understood, compose more than one-third of the new trees planted this year, although the oak has increased in popularity, and indications are that it will be used upon a much larger scale in the future.
