Good Dust Absorber.

A common floor mop soaked in coal oil makes a good dust absorber. Soak the mop thoroughly, after which hang it out in the air for three or four days; it will then be ready for use. POPULARITY OF WILLOW FURNITURE

There is so little variation from year to year in willow furniture that reference to the most recent productions must of necessity be confined to odd pieces or to the occasional change from staple designs. The display for 1911 does not materially differ from that of previous years, and yet there are a few novel touches that cannot fail to interest the owner of a country estate or, failing this desirable possession, the who makes a practice of putting the town house in summer dress.

Nothing is so conducive to comfort in all sorts of weather as willow furniture. Whether it be in the light tan natural hue or shellacked in green or brown or gold or bronze it suggests comfort. And now that it has become the custom to supply cushions that are equally comfortable for the chairs and divans willow furniture is more in demand than ever at all seasons.

The most pronounced change from old styles is found in the willow settees which have been mentioned in the requirements of the regulation divan, which it closely imitates with its high back and arms. Supplied with cushions covered in harmonizing tones a willow divan is an attractive piece of furniture. Another form of sofa made its appearance this season. At the first glance it appears as if three old-fashioned chairs were pushed together and fastened together. The joining is permanent, however, and upholstered with back and chair cushions of tapestry patterned cretonne. Arm and rocking chairs cushioned to match form a strikingly pretty set.

The fact for matching furniture has led to the introduction of several practical articles in willow, the list including a desk, magazine and paper stand and bookcase. The desk is a substantial affair with a number of drawers and instead of the customary high back chair is supplied with a broad seat like the modern piano bench, which is fashioned from willow.

The latest paper and bookrack is a convenient invention. The upper part consists of a deep rack in which a goodly number of papers may be stored away and beneath are two broad shelves for books and magazines. The bookcases of willow are fashioned on the regulation lines of the low, open type, but fitted up with a number of drawers and one of the new oval tables in willow wood, which is the most of the simplest of summer homes of the most pretentious.

As mentioned above, the oval table is preferred in willow to the square or the round variety and the newest table covers are oval. Natural cretonne covers are the latest addition and on a willow stand it is effective.

For cushions and tables in a room furnished in willow there are the loveliest of cretonnes in tapestry designs and colorings, chintzes in the old-time floral patterns and adaptations of oriental designs. A 5 o'clock tea cloth in beige color with gay patterns and flowers in bright tones appeals to the up-to-date hostess and so, too, do the pillow tops in cretonne and silk, which are used but a bit of finishing to serve admirably as stand covers. In keeping with the fancy for cretonne, the cretonne hangings the latest wall paper comes in a similar design and at a distance cannot be distinguished.

Eliminating Ink From Mahogany.

Marking Laundry.
