Skirts Still Narrow.

The skirts are, in the main, narrow. A few models show slightly draped effects, and there are some models in which plaits have been introduced. But the whole idea of a narrow skirt has been maintained. The tailored suits are often in the really mannish styles. And mannish cloths are also used. These are in dark colors and rough weaves. Double-faced cloths are much used. All effects are quiet. An important feature is the preponderance of long sleeves for afternoon dresses. Practically every jacket suit has the full-length sleeve. All of the waists accompanying the three-piece suits, as well as the bodices of afternoon dresses, have long sleeves. This lower sleeve has a slight fullness toward the elbow, which is drawn into a cuff. But there are no extreme effects in sleeves; no startling novelty to revolutionize garment cutting. The conservative spirit governs. The desire is to make salable, wearable dresses, suits and wraps. From their contact with so many American buyers it has been learned that too extreme and too advanced ideas are as bad for trade as anything could possibly be.

A Ribbon Workbag.

A novel workbag that has the added advantage of being quickly made up is constructed from a yard of wide ribbon, preferably six or eight inches. As the bag is in four compartments, all drawing on the same string, the ribbon is folded in half, then three folds are made at either side until the ribbon is equally divided in space to form four compartments. Sew the selvages together in pairs to make four divisions, each four and a half inches in depth. Overcast the edges neatly with tiny stitches. This will leave three top folds, which are cut for a depth of two inches from either edge. Crochet eight small rings of brass or bone with embroidery silk to harmonize with the colors in the bag. Sew a ring to each corner of the four bags and through them run a double length of silk cord or narrow ribbon, which passes over either end, will open and close bags at once. Do not use too soft a ribbon. The heavy flowered effects with satin edges are pretty and will stand upright when opened, which makes it easier to discover contents.

Pony Coats.

For popular-priced garments it is difficult to find any fur which will meet all the requirements necessary so well as pony skin. For this reason pony skins are again being extensively used. The natural pony is sharing the favor of the dyed variety, and when combined with nutria or beaver trimmings makes a good-looking coat for a small price. It is well to mention in this connection that the real Russian pony coats are the kind mostly used, as the caifskin does not find ready sale, now that the best grade of pony has dropped to reasonable prices.

AMUSING GAMES FOR HALLOWEEN

Fortune telling is always in favor with the young people—and the older ones, too—and when one is not skilled in reading palms or telling fortunes with cards the following plan furnishes much amusement for a crowd: One of the girls in the party is dressed as a witch and sits at a table or in a little improvised "hut" in one corner of the room with her broomstick beside her. Her black cat, to which she appeals for help in telling the fortunes, is also there. The fortunes consist of questions and answers. The "witch" has a list of questions with ten answers for each one. When one of the guests wishes to have his fortune told she asks him these questions and bids him answer with some number from one to ten, then she consults her cat, or, in other words, the paper in her lap, and reads the answer opposite the number he gives. The questions and answers may be as original and varied as one likes, and when all the guests are well known some amusing answers may be prepared in advance, which answers both serious and humorous. What is your aim in life? What quality do you most admire in a man—or girl? What is your disposition? Where would you like to live? What is your favorite name? What do you most dislike? What is to be the occupation of your life partner?

An amusing game is guessing "profiles." This may be made by having each guest sit for a moment in a darkened room with a light at one side throwing the shadow of his face on a sheet. The profiles may be traced off quickly by holding a thin paper up to the sheet, and when every one has been "taken" the profiles are cut out and numbered and pinned up around the room. Each guest is given a pencil and paper and writes down the names of all he can guess. The guessing is not as easy as one might imagine, and some laughable mistakes are made. To the one who makes the most correct list of answers a choice of the profiles is given as a souvenir. "Guessing ghosts" is an interesting game one hostess planned. She asked each guest to bring the earliest photograph to be found of himself or herself, and nearly all brought pictures taken when they were babies. These she numbered lightly with a pencil, writing the names on the back, and placed them all on the library table, over which hung a printed poster, "Ghosts of Ourselves." Then she asked each guest to take a pencil and a pencil, and the guessing began. A great deal of it was purely "guessing," too, yet some of the baby faces bore a resemblance to the grown-ups, and the guests had a merry time studying the tiny features and trying to trace in them a likeness to the faces around the table. After every one had finished the hostess read the name of No. 1, and each one who had it on his paper was asked to raise his hand. The ones who did not raise their hands were asked in turn what names had and their answers caused much laughter. This was done with each of the eighteen names, and the guests all voted it a unique and amusing game.

Fall Collars.

A large variety of fall collars is being shown for fall. While the newer models do not show the regulation sailor collar, many are made with the new shaped sailor, which almost reaches to the waist line, but is considerably narrower than the old style. Large round collars and pointed collars also much in evidence. Hoods and hood effects are meeting with considerable success. Some of the coats have the collars made so as to have an adjustable hood which can be used to cover the head when desired. When unbuttoned it forms a sailor collar. Double collars, consisting of a deep cape collar coming over the shoulder and a small turn-down collar, usually of another material, are also seen in the lines. While the variety of collars has been sold with the variety of collars, a few are made with the standing military collar.

Fads and Fancies.

The newer petticoat models show plaited flounces topped by silk fringe. Lace gowns are revived and lined with black or colored tulle and satin. Fringe in long silk strands is on everything—gowns, coats, sashes and bags. White tulle hovers on the scene in shapes of white felt with many wings are now. Big collars of lace or embroidered muslin almost hide some of the little silk coats. White satin, veiled with chantilly, makes up some of the richest gowns of the season. Velvet cords are a novelty—black and white gowns, for instance, with gray cords. Both these, too, come in plain colors. For early fall the predominating fashion will be the small and medium-sized leather bags with handles of moderate length. For fall traveling loose, one-piece and empire closed, and alpaca and silk wrap gowns are made by French tailors. Side-plaited ribbons, generally with colored edges, are a new and very popular trimming on dresses and sometimes on hats. The fichu drapery of the bodice is being used for evening and even for afternoon wear with the V-shaped opening at the neck. Turbans and turbans in two colors are very smart and may be of all cloth or felt or combined with satin velvet or heavy silk. Draped effects appear in turbans and toques and small hats galore; these are most attractive in the long-haired cloth and ribbed silk. Fichus are seen in every possible soft material from chiffon to handkerchief lawn, from wash net to embroidered or all-over lace. The tiny coats attract now. They are made amusing by their quaint little basques and their like, which is shorter in front than the neck. We are most assuredly to retain the slim, clinging draperies of the first empire that have proved so successful during the past twelve months. There is a new version of the kimono waist which is draped and gathered so that there is no break between bodice and sleeves.


