Anniversary of Jackson's Victory at New Orleans.

IT MADE HIM PRESIDENT

Observance Has Now Become Mainly Political Affair.

BATTLE A NOTABLE ONE

Overcome Superior Force of British After Treaty of Peace Had Been Signed at Ghent.

The 8th of January, known as Jackson day, from its being the anniversary of Gen. Jackson's victory over the British forces of superior numbers, below New Orleans, in 1815, will ever be one of the many days worthy to be celebrated by Americans.

After End of War. Were the day not the anniversary of the battle, it would pass with little notice, and had we then possessed the means of communication of the present time the battle would not have been fought.

try and by our vessels at sea. The Constitution, Capt. Stewart, captured the Cayenne and Le Vant February 30. The Hornet and Peacock had a fight with a British frigate, April 27. The Hornet, Capt. Biddle, captured the Penguin March 22.

Met a Superior Force. In the latter part of 1814 the British turned their attention to this point, and when the deciding battle was fought they had a force of 14,000 men under Sir Edward Pakenham, while Gen. Jackson had a force of about 6,000, mostly militia of Kentucky, Tennessee and Louisiana.

Honor a Proud One. "Possessing the dispositions which equally adorn the citizen and the soldier, the expectations of your country will be met in peace, as her wishes have been gratified in war. Go, then, my brave companions, to your homes; to me and to the nation, I have entrusted your names and your names will be honored and crowned with laurels that will never fade."

Farewell to Army. Commander Daniel T. Patterson, with gunboats, co-operated with Gen. Jackson and his services were highly commended. In March Gen. Jackson took leave of his army and in his farewell address said: "The major general is enabled to perform the pleasing task of restoring to Tennessee, Kentucky and Louisiana, and the territory of the Mississippi, the brave troops who have acted such a distinguished part in the war which has just terminated. 
GETTING A GIRL
