GIVE MESSAGE TO PRESIDENT TO SEND TWO DOCUMENTS TO CONGRESS.

President to Send Two Documents to Congress.

OTHER WILL BE COMMENT ON REPORT OF THE POSTAL RATE COMMISSION.

President Taft was busy in his office today gathering data for two forthcoming messages to Congress.

The report of this commission was submitted to the President several weeks ago, and as he is especially interested in postal matters, he probably will not content himself with a brief letter of transmittal, but will write an extended message, in which he will discuss the recommendations of the postal commission.

The commission resulted from a fight between the President and Postmaster General Hitchcock for the right to favor an increase in second-class postal rates, and the periodical publishers, who opposed the increase on the ground that it was not needed or desirable.

The commission held hearings in New York and elsewhere during the last year and the testimony taken fills nine large volumes. The postal message probably will go to Congress within the next few weeks.

MATTERS AFFECTING DISTRICT.

The District message, on which the President is also working, will include a number of general topics of interest to the welfare of the people of the District.

WOULD AMEND BILL TO AID MISS HOUGHTON

Senator Bristow Has Another Plan for Reimbursing Injured Census Clerk.

Aiding the movement for the relief of Miss Alice V. Houghton, the census bureau clerk who was scalped by some machinery, near which she was working at the time she was injured.

Some members of the Senate yesterday afternoon, and Senator Crawford urged its passage. But Senator Bristow announced that he desired to perfect an amendment, and action was delayed.

Senator Bristow announced today that he had the bill, Miss Houghton should be paid in accordance with the general idea of equitable workman's compensation and employers' liability, as evolved by the joint commission of Congress and the State of New York.

Investigation of that subject has been made, Senator Bristow points out, and he wishes to consult with the members of the committee in the case of employees of common carriers. Where there is permanent total disability that bill provides, the injured employee is to be paid 90 per cent of the wages he was receiving at the time of his injury for the remainder of his life.

Where there is temporary total disability the same rate of compensation is to be paid during the period of the disability. The rate for permanent partial disability, following an injury, or a less one, varies in accordance with the injury. These rates, however, are in addition to the medical and hospital services, for which the employer is to pay.

Favors Installment Plan. Senator Bristow said today he did not know whether or not the amount to be paid Miss Houghton under such a plan would be greater than \$3,500, proposed by the Senate claims committee.

Senator Bristow will not delay in the preparation of the amendment, as delay would hold up the relief which the present bill is intended to give, and the Senate probably will act in the case within a short time.

Helm Holds Army Political Adjunct to the Presidency. Representative Harvey Helm of Kentucky, chairman of the House committee on expenditures in the War Department, commenting today upon the case of Maj. Beecher E. Ray of the Pay Corps of the army, made a bitter attack on the army "as a political adjunct to the presidency of the United States."

Mr. Helm declared the War Department was in politics, and thought the country ought to know about it.

"Men with no morals have been placed in the army," said Mr. Helm, "just because they have assisted in the election of Presidents and are able to swing votes. The most serious feature of the Ray case is the fact that it is a political adjunct to the presidency."
