Want Legion of Honor.

FIRST SPRING GROWTH

Buds Appear and Leaves Soon
Will Follow—An Ideal Season in Capital.

The changing aspects of nature incident to the opening of the spring season can be followed by the city resident just as well as by the rural dweller, providing always the city resident lives in Washington. Unlike the dwellers in the average city, the citizens of the Capital city live in the midst of the unfolding beauties of the foliage of the trees. This city stands in a forest not only of great beauty and profusion, but also of marked vigor and strength. The processes of nature as the traces of the bare limbs of the trees gradually filled in and the graceful masses of the leaves evolved can be followed day by day.

Observations of this kind require no trip to the country or planning to be away from the daily routine of business. The pages of the book of nature are open so that all who run may read. There are no choice locations in this city where nature is in a class above the rest. Wherever there are streets, there also are trees. It is a condition unknown in any other city in the world. The Washington now surpasses Paris in the number of its trees, and in their general distribution throughout the entire municipal area it has no equal in the world.

Signs of Spring Everywhere.
But at the present time it is possible for even the careless eye to follow the various stages of absorbing interest in the gradual clothing of the framework of the branches with the soft, fresh verdure of the season. It is a process that can be seen in all its stages owing to the variety of the species of trees. Long before the elms and the oaks enter their winter aspect, the maples and lindens have budded and blossomed and even begun to leaf. One street where the softer woods are found is brought in contrast with an intersecting street where there are trees of the harder varieties. With earlier varieties the budding period is over. The delicate tracery of any other kind is as the leaves fill the openings, as it is between the threads of the branches and twigs. As the process goes on, and as the buds open, a light vapor of greenish hue has been noticed in the air. The more pronounced green of the leaves marks the next stage, and then begins the evolution of the green of the foliage, which is so grateful to the eye, and which for the next five months will constitute the chief charm of the city, exceeding in beauty and interest any other which man with his millions has been able to achieve.
