MINERS' CONFAB ON Anthracite Workers Again Confer With Operators. HOPEFUL OF CONCESSIONS Idle Union Men in Eastern Coal Fields Expect Wage Boost and Union Recognition.

PHILADELPHIA, April 10.—Miners and operators will meet in joint conference here today and make another attempt to reach an agreement on the Pottsville conference of the one that expired March 31 and send back to work the 175,000 idle anthracite mine workers.

This move, according to members of the miners' committee, will be a retort of their original demands, supplemented by arguments if the operators will listen. The miners' committee cannot present any other proposition aside from the mine conference, or rejection of the Pottsville convention last November.

It is believed that today's meeting is only the start of a series of conferences, and that before they are ended an agreement will be reached. The miners have received the impression from published interviews with operators in New York that they will be given an increase in wages and a 10 per cent cost-of-living advance, which will be greatly appreciated if the operators fail to make this concession.

Hope for Union Recognition. They also hope for recognition of the union, and will press the demand, it is said. If the 10 per cent advance is granted along with other concessions the miners may instruct their leaders to withdraw the demand for recognition of the union.

The executive committees of the three anthracite districts, numbering thirty-two men, met at a hotel in the afternoon and afternoon of yesterday. The Pottsville committee which will confer with the operators is made up of nine district officers and John P. White, the national president of the United Mine Workers.
