MILLION TOTAL IN FOUR YEARS

Activities of Organization in All Lands Discussed Today in International Conference.

The part taken by the Red Cross Christmas seals in the fight against tuberculosis was described in a paper read this morning at the international conference. The author of the paper, Dr. Philip P. Jacobs, assistant secretary of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

RAPID INCREASE NOTED.
