

TRIS TO GET CROWN WHAT THE BATTERERS ARE DOING IN THE BIG LEAGUES

PORT ERIC, Ontario, July 27.—The Schorr luck, which has been remarkable on the Canadian racing circuit this season, was again in evidence at Port Erie this afternoon, when the entry of the Memphis brewer, Star Charter and Frog Legs, finished one, two in the five-thousand dollar Dominion handicap, one of the richest events of the season in these parts.
