

URGES LIBRARY CASH

Trade Board Committee Cites Need at Takoma Park.

CHARITIES BOARD UPHELD

Movement for Superintendent Is Disapproved—Electrocution in District Favored.

Declaring that Congress has not kept faith with Andrew Carnegie in appropriating for the maintenance of the branch public library at Takoma Park, the library committee of the Board of Trade at a meeting in the Public Library yesterday afternoon voted to recommend that Congress be urged to increase its appropriation for that branch and for the main library also.

When Mr. Carnegie agreed to give the money for the branch library, it was said, it was with the understanding that Congress would appropriate one-tenth of the cost of the building for its maintenance each year.

The committee also believes that the appropriation for the main library should be increased. It is pointed out that in cities of approximately the same size as Washington from 16 to 21 per cent of the original cost of the library building is appropriated annually for the maintenance of the library.

Urges Marking of Historic Places.

At a meeting yesterday afternoon of the committee on municipal art, which Richard B. Watrous is chairman, it was decided to recommend that places of historic interest in and about the National Capital be permanently marked.

Following approval given the plan by the District Commissioners, the Washington Gas Light Company, it was announced today, will establish an automobile emergency service to respond to all fire alarms.


