HARBOR POLICE ACTIVE ALONG RIVER BANKS

Boats Maintaining Day and Night Patrol to Prevent Illegal Fishing.

A day and night patrol is being kept by the boats attached to the harbor police precinct over the waters of the District in order to prevent illegal fishing for shad and herring, and Lieut. Dean has instructed his men to pay particular attention to the Virginia side of the river, where most of the illegal fishing is said to be done.

The launches belonging to the harbor precinct are being used in the work, and the vigilance also will make frequent cruises about the harbor in order to make the patrol more effective. Under the fisheries laws of the District it is illegal to catch fish in District waters with anything but hook and line.

Until recently the residents of Virginia opposite the District have been using nets while standing on shore. It was contended by the District officials that this was illegal and an arrest was made of a Virginian fishing from the river.

In the Police Court a fine was imposed, and on the matter being taken to the District Court of Appeals the decision of the Police Court was sustained on the ground that when the portion of Virginia formerly the District was retroceded back to Virginia the act did not give Virginia back the riparian rights she had had before what is now Alexandria county became a portion of the District.

The decision gives the District authority to high-water mark, and while the District authorities cannot go on Virginia soil and make an arrest for violation of the fishing laws, the names of the violators will be obtained and they will be indicted by the grand jury.

Law to Be Enforced. On this indictment a requisition will be made on the Virginia authorities for the offender, and he will be brought here for trial. This plan was followed last season, and a number of persons were arrested and fined for dipping for herring from the rocks on the Virginia shore. It is stated that the police authorities are notifying the residents of the Virginia side of the river of the determination to enforce the law, and it is generally thought that violations will be few.

FRIEDMANN NOT ACCUSED. Treasury Official Says He Has Not Violated Serum Laws.

At no time since his arrival in this country has Dr. Friedrich Franz Friedmann violated the public health laws governing the sale of unlicensed serums, in the opinion of the Treasury Department. From a high officer in the Treasury it has been learned that investigations made so far do not warrant that any legal steps should be taken against him.

The jury in the case of A. D. Worth, who has been on trial at Staunton, Va. for shooting Luther B. Bosseman at the latter's home, brought in a verdict of guilty and fixed Worth's sentence at five years in the penitentiary.

RATIONAL TREATMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS.

The normal individual in good health has a considerable degree of resistance to tuberculous infection. This immunity differs to some extent in different races, different families and different individuals of the same family. There is also a tendency to recovery from infection, in the earlier stages of the disease, if circumstances relating to the habits and environment of the individual are favorable. This is shown by the fact that post-mortem examinations show that many persons dying from other diseases present evidence of healed tuberculous processes in the lungs. It is well known that many recognized cases of tuberculosis recover, but evidence obtained at autopsies shows that a considerable proportion of the population, who had not been suspected of being infected with this widely prevalent disease, have, in fact, at some time during their life had a localized lung infection.

may be cured without medical treatment, let us inquire what are the conditions most favorable for such recovery. In pursuing this inquiry we shall find that these conditions are identical with those which have been found the most important factors in the prevention of the disease. Those factors are the various conditions as to fresh air, wholesome food, or good habits, etc., which favor a robust state of health. Where there is a normal vital resisting power the susceptibility to tuberculous infection is slight. But when the vital resistance is below par, for any reason, this susceptibility is greatly increased. The predisposing causes are to a certain extent inherited. That is, some persons are born with insufficient lung capacity, feeble digestion, or a nervous system which easily gives way to strain.

Need Careful Guarding. Such persons are especially liable to suffer from unfavorable conditions of environment and they furnish a considerable proportion of the cases of tuberculosis. They should be guarded from crowding, insufficient or indigestible food, overwork or overplay, or pernicious habits. A most important point in the treatment of tuberculosis is the early recognition of the fact that the tubercle bacillus has effected a lodgment in the lungs or elsewhere. This is fundamental for the earlier the diagnosis is made the better will be the prospect of complete recovery.

Unfortunately in a large proportion of the cases an early diagnosis is not made. Many of the so-called "incipient" cases which are sent to sanatoriums are found by skilled physicians to be in the second stage of the disease. The detection of early cases calls for special skill in physical diagnosis. The presence of tubercle bacilli in the sputum confirms the diagnosis, but much valuable time will often be lost if we wait for this confirmation, which shows that the tubercles in the lungs are already "breaking down." When the diagnosis is in doubt it will often be wise to

give the patient the benefit of the doubt and of the rational treatment which we recommend. A young person who is losing weight and easily tired, and has a slight elevation of temperature in the afternoon, either with or without cough, should be advised to lead the outdoor life and to avoid everything which would be likely to lower his vital resisting power. If he is not already infected, he is a favorable subject for infection by the tubercle bacillus.

Care in Early Stages. The ambitious student presenting such symptoms of lowered vitality should have his hours of study greatly restricted or completely interrupted until there is evidence that he has recovered his normal vigor. The young girl who is devoted to the pleasures of society should heed the first warnings of falling strength if she would escape the dangers of tuberculous infection. It is easy to give advice, but for those who depend upon their own efforts for their daily bread, or for the support of others who are dependent upon them, the advice we give is hard to follow. The clerk, the factory worker and others who follow an indoor occupation, under the pressure of pecuniary need, will usually postpone any decisive action calling for a sacrifice of income until, too often, the time has passed when a cure can be effected. Such individuals are especially entitled to our sympathy and should be aided by public funds or private philanthropy to take the "rational treatment" at a near-home sanatorium.

Advantages of a Sanatorium. The advantages of treatment in a sanatorium, within easy reach of the patient's home, are evident. The favorable results of "the rational treatment" in a sanatorium are illustrated by the statistics of sanatoria located in different parts of the country. Thus at Adirondack Cottage Sanatorium at Saranac Lake, of fifty-seven in-patient cases treated during the year 1912, twenty-three are reported as "apparently cured," twenty-one as "disease arrested," eleven as "improved" and two as "unimproved." The average residence of these fifty-seven patients at the sanatorium was six months and twenty-nine days. Of 231 cases treated at the Adirondack Cottage Sanatorium during the year 1912, 124 were found in the sputum at the time of entry, and never found in eighty-six (42.8 per cent). This emphasizes what we have said with reference to the making of a diagnosis and commencing the rational treatment without waiting until the diagnosis is confirmed by the finding of tubercle bacilli. In addition to life in the open air, the ra-

tional treatment includes the dealing with complications as they arise—cough, night sweats, hemorrhage and constipation cannot be regarded as specific medication in view of the results reported by the Adirondack Cottage Sanatorium. A quote from the last (1912) report of this institution: "Slight variations in percentage in favor of tuberculin may easily be explained by a longer period of average residence. Whereas of ninety-three patients who took tuberculin, 41 per cent lost the tubercle bacilli in the sputum, only 28 per cent lost the tubercle bacilli in the sputum."

CONTRACT TO GERMAN FIRM.

Two Gigantic Floating Cranes for Use on Panama Canal.

Contracts for the construction of two gigantic floating cranes for use in connection with the Panama canal have been let by the Isthmian canal commission to Neumeyer & Diamond of New York, agents for the Deutsche Maschinenfabrik, a German concern, whose bid of \$837,600 was more than \$500,000 below that of the lowest American bidder.

These cranes will be designed so as to work together or separately, each producing its own electrical power and having a lifting capacity of 300 tons. Each will have a "jib" with an outstretch of eighty-two feet, and will be capable of revolving with a load without moving the pontoon. The contracts were let under a provision of the act of Congress authorizing the purchase abroad of equipment for the canal in any case where domestic bids are unreasonable. Rigid enforcement of the Sunday law will be started in Charles Town, W. Va., Sunday. The sale of soda water, cigars, cigarettes and tobacco will cease.
