VETERANS' TEARS DOT THE GRAVES OF NATION'S DEAD

Trembling Hands of War Veterans Strew Flowers Over Departed Comrades.

EULOGISTIC RITES HELD IN NEARBY CEMETERIES

Touching Scenes Mark Memorial Ceremonies in the District.

CHIEF RITES AT ARLINGTON

Members of G. A. R. Posts and Thousands of Citizens Assemble There to Pay Tribute to Country's Heroes.

On Fane's eternal camping ground their silent tents are spread. And silver grave-stones, with the names of the dead.

Marching with steps that each year become more faltering, beneath the waving folds of the Stars and Stripes they followed through many a heart-breaking campaign or on many a bloody, hard-fought battlefield, Washington's veterans of the war between the states, with the soldiers of the Spanish-American war, today paid their annual tribute of flowers and tears to the departed comrades whose graves dot the silent cities of the dead.

All Cemeteries Visited.

The principal exercises, of course, were those at Arlington national cemetery, where the department officers of the Department of the Potomac, Grand Army of the Republic, several hundred comrades of the various posts composing the department, conducted the ceremonies, in the presence of a crowd numbering thousands. At Congressional cemetery, Glenwood, Oak Hill, Rock Creek cemetery, Soldiers' Home, Arlington national cemetery, and other burial grounds in and near Washington groups of veterans gathered to do their duty to the dead, and to plant upon the graves the tiny flags which mark the soldier's last sleeping place.

Character of Rites.

At all the exercises addresses praising the valor of the departed heroes, made, poems were recited and choruses of children and church choirs lifted their voices in patriotic songs. The reading of Lincoln's great Gettysburg address was a part of every program, for all realized that in this address the emancipator had said best what all wished to say.



BRITISH KING RECEIVES AMERICAN AMBASSADOR

Formality of Presenting Letters of Credence Takes Place at Buckingham Palace.

LONDON, May 30.—Walter Hines Page, the newly appointed United States ambassador to the court of St. James, was received today by King George, to whom he presented his letters of credence.

Complication Over Legislation.

COMES TO THE DEFENSE OF GOVERNMENT CLERK

Governors' Board of Retail Merchants Disclaims Views of Association's President.

The board of governors of the Retail Merchants' Association has called to the defense of the government clerk. The resolution states that the association disclaims the views expressed by Mr. Strasburger, whose statements, the governors declare, were unauthorized and not sanctioned by the association or any committee thereof.

Board's Declaration.

"It is the sense of the board of governors of the Retail Merchants' Association that the persons of the government employees is of a very high character, and that the said government employees as a class in no manner whatsoever attempt to disregard the payment of their honest debts, and the discharge of their honest obligations."
