MURDERED IN OFFICE. Californian Strangled With Tablecloth, Then Robbed. LOS ANGELES, Cal. June 26.—Charles E. Pendell, a real estate dealer, was murdered yesterday in his office in a downtown building. The body was discovered last night by his widow. Pendell had been strangled with a tablecloth and beaten on the head with some blunt weapon. His diamond watch, pin and ring and his money were missing. Pendell had not been seen since early in the afternoon. Mrs. Pendell, distraught by grief, could suggest no motive for the murder. Her husband had a fortune estimated at a quarter of a million dollars.

WARFARE ON GUNS TO STRIKE AT SALE

Police Court Officials Say Purchase of Weapons Is Far Too Easy.

LAW NOW INADEQUATE, IS OPINION EXPRESSED

Judges Pugh and Muldowny in Favor of More Stringent Regulations.

The consensus of opinion of the Police Court authorities who probably have more experience with the "gun-packing" and razor-carrying element of the city than any other persons in the District, is that the purchase of deadly weapons should be made a very difficult matter, and the punishment for transgressions against this law severe.

Judge Pugh, who interviewed today by a representative of The Star, said that the campaign against the carrying of weapons, especially revolvers, is one of the most useful and important ever conducted in Washington, and one to which every one of the better class of citizens should heartily subscribe.

"Congress cannot go too far," Judge Pugh said, "toward preventing the carrying of deadly weapons. While every one is guaranteed the right of having weapons in his home under provision of the Constitution, yet it would do no harm to have the authorities apprised of every one so armed."

Would Aim at Sale. "The way to reduce the ranks of the 'gun-toters,'" the judge continued, "is to strike at the sale of firearms. At present there is a law making it an offense to sell deadly weapons without having obtained a special permit to dispose of them, but a tax should be put upon the purchaser of the weapons."

Judge Muldowny declared himself to be in absolute sympathy with any law that would reduce the number of persons who carry weapons. "I think," Judge Muldowny said, "that the sale of firearms should be made a difficult thing to procure a 'gun.'"

"There is very little reason for any one carrying a revolver at any time," the judge continued, "and at present there is not a single permit to carry one. There is a law which requires a bond of \$300 required of every one to whom a permit is granted by the clerk of the Police Court, with the consent of Judge Pugh and myself, and permits are granted only after good and sufficient reasons have been set forth why the applicant should be granted this privilege. The permit is good for only thirty days."

Present Law Not Effective. "The present law does not seem effective in preventing the carrying of revolvers," the judge said further, "and the only way to prevent this pernicious practice of persons going armed is to enact some law making the purchase of weapons an extremely hard matter. It would be a grave mistake, I think, to strike out the word 'openly' from the proposed law. This section is very necessary."

Francis A. Sebring, the clerk of the Police Court, by whom all permits to carry arms are granted, when questioned today by The Star reporter, said that the solution of the problem, as he sees it, is to make it necessary for any person who wishes to purchase a revolver to state the reasons why he desires to have the firearm.

By this system, Mr. Sebring said, the character of the man desiring to purchase any weapon may be investigated, and if he is considered a credit to the community, with a gun the permit will be refused.

Real Estate Bond Required.

"Under the present system," Mr. Sebring said, "we require that the applicant for a permit to carry a revolver for thirty days furnish a real estate bond of \$200, and in my opinion, a similar bond should be required when a person is asked to purchase a revolver. Then, in the event of the successful applicant for the privilege of buying a gun making some unwise use of it, the bond will be forfeited, and in addition whatever other penalties may be incurred."

One point on which both judges and the clerk of the court agreed was that the penalty for violation of the law prohibiting the carrying of arms and the proposed law to make their purchase a matter of difficulty should not be made too severe. They each expressed the opinion that in such cases fines would almost invariably acquit prisoners charged with such offenses rather than send them to the penitentiary or jail for a term out of proportion with the gravity of the offense, though they might be unquestionably guilty.

WARDAMAN GOES ON RECORD.

Senator Opposes Sale in the U. S. of Guns and Liquor.

Senator Wardaman of Mississippi has on record as being strongly opposed to the sale in the United States of guns, and of liquor. He declared that there is more harm in a drink of bad liquor than there is in a gun, and that he would vote for a law that would make it more difficult to obtain a gun than it is now.

Senator Benjamin R. Tillman of South Carolina also emphatically declared that there was need for more stringent laws against the carrying of weapons in the District of Columbia. He said he would be glad to vote for the Sims bill or some other similar measure.

While working in Potomac Park near the Highway bridge yesterday afternoon, James H. Stewart, forty-eight years old, resting at 517 7th street southwest, was accidentally shot by a boy who was shooting at birds with a .22-caliber rifle. The bullet struck Stewart in the chest, and he was taken to Emergency Hospital. The police are trying to establish the identity of the boy who did the shooting.

TRIP FOR LIBERTY BELL.

Likely to Go to Pacific Coast Despite Direful Predictions.


PHILADELPHIA, June 26.—Despite the dire predictions of expert metallurgists and others, it seems probable that the liberty bell, which proclaimed the independence of the United States 137 years ago, will be sent to the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco in 1915.

Assurances to this effect have been given by Mayor Blankenburg, in the face of most earnest protests from patriotic societies and individuals, who declare the bell to be a national treasure which will result in further extensions of the great crack in the bell's side, which may cause it to fall to pieces before it is returned to its resting place in Independence Hall.

ALEXANDRIA AFFAIRS HOUSE JOB HOLDERS GET EASE OF LIFE

Council Committees to Discuss Erection of New School Building. NEW HOME FOR FIREMEN

Relief Hook and Ladder Company May Be Provided With Modern Quarters.

Special Correspondence of The Star. ALEXANDRIA, Va., June 25, 1913. Plans for the erection of a new public school building, to be used for high school purposes, will be discussed tonight at a meeting of the joint committee on finance and schools of the city council.

This committee will make its recommendations to the city council at the next meeting of that body, which will be held July 8.

A sinking fund towards the erection of the proposed building, together with a new structure for the Relief hook and ladder fire company, will be brought about by the increased license tax netting the city approximately \$6,000 additional revenue a year.

It is hoped by the committee to be able to have the plans prepared within a short time, so that the work may be begun at an early date. The location of the school is yet to be determined upon.

The city now has a lot of several acres at the northwest corner of West and Cameron streets, purchased for public purposes. A number of the members of the school board feel disposed toward the erection of the building adjoining the Washington School for Boys.

The Central Trust Company of Frederick, Md., was awarded Monday an order of \$25,000 worth of bonds by the county commissioners. The sale of the bonds will be for some time, but were finally disposed of at par.
