CONFERS WITH BRYAN.

Henry M. Pindell Soon to be Nominated Russian Ambassador.

Henry M. Pindell, the Proctor, Ill., editor, said to be booked for appointment as United States ambassador to Russia, has had several conferences lately with Secretary Bryan at the State Department. It is said that Mr. Pindell has accepted the appointment and that his nomination will be sent to the Senate as soon as the Russian government has indicated that he is persona gratia.

While there is no technical objection to the presentation at the St. Petersburg court of an American ambassador, despite the non-existence of the usual treaty of friendship, commerce and navigation, it has been suggested that the event will present a favorable opportunity for an effort to re-establish the treaty relations that were terminated January 1 last by the denunciation of the half-century-old treaty between the two countries.
