MADE HUNGRY PLEA

FOR CURRENT SYSTEM

Representative Johnson of Kentucky Wants All Offices for Democrats.

DECLARED REPUBLICANS

ARE HURTING HIS PARTY

In Speech on Floor of House He Was Uncompromising in His Demand for Places.

An absolutely democratic government, with every government position held by a democrat, with every republican driven from office, was demanded today by Representative Johnson of Kentucky, chairman of the House District committee, in a speech on the floor made during the discussion of the rule to send the deficiency appropriation bill to conference.

Johnson's speech was absolutely uncompromising. He said that he would have every republican in office walk the plank with his arms tied behind him, to be left to the mercy of the sharks in the waters of the blue sea beneath.

Senator Overman Applauded.

Mr. Johnson was discussing and opposing the plan to disagree with the Senate amendment to the deficiency bill, which takes from the civil service several hundred positions in the internal revenue service, the most important being the deputy collectors. Senator Overman, author of the amendment, was sitting in the House at the time, and Mr. Johnson complimented the senator and received loud applause for so doing.

The correct principle is that when democrats are in power we should have democrats in office," he said. "We cannot have a correct democratic administration until we have every office held by a democrat. We find republicans all over in the government service. They are there to make trouble for the administration, and we find in a great many instances that they are doing so."

Deficiency Bill Taken Up.

The House took up the question of sending the deficiency bill to a conference shortly after noon and at a late hour the point of no return had not been made, although it is highly probable that some other bill will be taken up.

The fact that these two members are in sympathy with the civil service idea probably insures a vote against the Senate amendment in conference. The other member of the House conferees will be Representative Bartlett of Georgia, who is admittedly in favor of the spoils system.

Charges President With Fear.

Representative Mann of Illinois charged that the President is afraid to take offices from out of the civil service and a terrific row on the floor of the House ensued. The disturbance was so great that later in the afternoon Speaker Clark gave the House a severe "call down" and said that if anything like it occurred again he would reprimand the members of the House.

When Mr. Mann said the President was afraid Representative Barkley of Kentucky jumped up and suggested a proof of amendments to make it more attractive to smaller banks.

Says Violations Occur Daily.

Representative Campbell of Kansas charged that violations of the civil service law are going on every day. He said that the leaders of the present administration have been making assaults on the civil service ever since March 4, in spite of promises to the contrary.

David Lamar Hearing Continued.

Hearing on the habeas corpus obtained by David Lamar, the so-called "Wolf of Wall Street," was continued today by Chief Justice Clabaugh. Both United States Attorney Wilson and Attorney Henry E. Davis were engaged in the Court of Appeals and the postponement became necessary.

Debate Tuition Charge Question.

Students from nearby states should not have to pay tuition in the District public schools, according to a decision reached following a debate on the question by members of the Daniel Webster Club of Business High School.

Senator Hoke Smith Predicts Passage of Administration Measure About Jan. 15.

Most significant statements on the currency question were made by Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia today, in an interview with reporters at the White House.

SUBMITS TO INTERVIEW

IN WHITE HOUSE VISIT

Former Banking Committee Hears Views Today.

The three clean-cut features of the talk of the Georgia senator were to the effect that government supervision of supplemental currency, as proposed by the Wilson administration, will be accepted by a majority of the Senate, including a majority of the republicans in that body; that the currency bill will get through the Senate with the speed that has been expected in high quarters; that the Senate of the United States will support the bill in its final form, regardless of anybody's suggestions, and that the passage of the bill by January 15 or later will be a victory for President Wilson and the party.

"The currency bill will be perfected by the Wilson administration," he predicted, "and a majority of the country and a majority of the Senate, including a majority of the republicans, will accept the principle of government supervision. The whole thing in the Senate today is a matter of details, and the Senate will work out the Government supervision is absolutely essential."

Big Piece of Legislation.

"The enactment of a currency law is one of the biggest pieces of legislation that Congress has ever undertaken. I believe in a thorough study of the question. The Senate was free to amend the tariff bill and will feel free to amend and improve the Glass bill. The bill probably will reach the floor of the Senate about the middle of November, and should be thoroughly debated. If a vote is taken by January 15 or even later it will not be satisfactory."

As a known friend of the President, the remarks of Senator Smith were taken to indicate that the democrats will not undertake to make the currency measure a party affair, and that they will slowly but gradually force the bill to a vote, no matter how long it takes.

Measure No Party Affair.

Both Representatives Gillette and Bartlett had nothing to say according to their own viewpoints. Representative Sharp, a democrat of Ohio, took sides with the anti-spoils man and said: "If we want to keep this party in power, let us keep the civil service inviolate."

TO HOUSE DEPARTMENT

Labor Branch of Government Budgets About by Lack of Funds.

Very much against its wishes, the Department of Labor will move to the old District building on Louisiana avenue, where its bureau of labor statistics is now located. This move was made necessary on account of the small appropriation which is allowed in the urgent deficiency bill to house the new department. Only \$5,000 is appropriated in the bill, and that only to house the remainder of the calendar year.
