III. The Manufacturing Industry.

By Frederic J. Haskin.

The famous lexicographer who declared that there were three kinds of lies, "lies, damn lies and statistics," must have been struggling with something that was growing too rapidly to be counted. Certainly, statistics of the women's wear manufacturing industry would be almost impossible to compile. Our decennial census is far too slow to keep pace with an industry that in New York alone expands so rapidly as to make even last year's map obsolete.

There are more than 10,000 manufacturing establishments in New York city devoted to women's wear. They employ enough people to populate a great city, and the stream of gold flowing through their channels is so wide and deep that the imagination scarce can fathom it. Men began to wear factory-made clothing some fifty years ago, although it is only within the last decade that well-to-do and well-dressed men have turned from the custom tailor to the tailor's shop.

Ready-made women's clothing is a much later development. Indeed, many of the women's wear makers, though nothing in its utility, varied and spun the wool, wove the cloth, cut and made their garments. Our mothers bought cloth, wove it, cut it, and made it. At the most, they depended on some other woman to cut and fit and make their gowns.

At first the "sweatshop" reigned supreme. Manufacturers cut fabric and made up the garments, and sent it out into the streets. The movement gained momentum. The industry grew with amazing rapidity. Loft buildings on lower Broadway began to be turned into factories. Far-seeing landlords began to erect buildings especially designed for women's clothing.

This method is a much more expensive method, and can be employed only on garments where there is a comparatively large margin of profit.

Most of the manufacturers, many of the salesmen and a very large majority of the working people are immigrants, mostly Jews from Russia, and the Balkans. Wage conditions in these factories are, on the whole, satisfactory. It has been only the cheaper garments, such as shirt waists and underwear, that there have been serious and long-continued labor troubles.

It exhibits the modern tendency toward operation and consolidation by concentrating in one area. SYLVESTER ADDRESSES NEW YORK POLICE CHIEFS

Successful Modern Methods of Tracing Criminals Compared to Old.

Chief of Police Sylvester, who is attending the meeting of the chiefs of police of New York, at Rochester, is expected to return tonight. Addressing the association, Maj. Sylvester told of a letter he had recently received from the chief of police of Paris which contained an explanation of a new camera that had been invented by a Frenchman. He said its mechanism is so fine that it will show up the smallest defect, blemish or peculiarity in an article or person's appearance. Thus its work is so remarkable that a single disclosed hair in a fur garment could be shown in the smallest detail, so that the articles if found anywhere could at once be recognized through the photograph.

Discusses Police Methods.

Discussing the invention, Maj. Sylvester noted the difference between police methods of today and those of years ago, and stated that with the change in the methods there also has come a change in the characteristics of the successful police chiefs. "The two most famous chiefs the country has ever produced, Byrnes of New York and Harrigan of St. Louis, were entirely different types from your successful chiefs of today, such as Chief Quigley, for instance," said Maj. Detectives Better.

"Nowhere are the improvements being more manifested than in the detective forces," said the chief. "The means of identifying and tracing criminals are infinitely superior to those of a few years ago. The fingerprint method of identification is now in common use. We have the bureau of identification, where the fingerprints and prints of criminals are sent for identification, and many other institutions that were unknown several years ago."

"But in spite of these helps a good detective is born, not educated. Besides the additional sense that the successful detective captures, he must know the men who are working under him thoroughly, so that he can direct them intelligently and give each the duties to which he is best suited."
