JEW OF THE CAPITAL OBSERVE YOM KIPPUR

Fastings and Prayers for Forgiveness Mark Day of Atonement Rites.

All Jewish people in Washington, both orthodox and reformed, are today observing the Day of Atonement, or Yom Kippur, which represents to the Jews what Lent does to Christians.

Four services are being celebrated today in all the Jewish synagogues and temples. Beginning at 10 o'clock this morning, the services continue practically continuously until this evening.

Yom Kippur is to be followed next Wednesday by the feast of the tabernacles or Succoth, as the Jews call it. This is a great day of gladness, when the Jews give thanks for the mercy of God and for the blessings of the harvest time.

The celebration will begin Wednesday night, and the principal services will last twenty-four hours, although the period of fasting and rejoicing continues for about eight days.

The custom for the Jews to congregate at the temples for the holiday, each family erected a rough shelter or pavilion, in which were offered up the prayers of thanksgiving and in which also their friends were welcomed and feasted.

At the Eight Street Temple Wednesday night there will be a service that will be a children's harvest festival.

MUST PAY BACK ALIMONY. J. Henry Clark Ordered by Justice Stafford to Give Wife \$2,000.

Arrangements of alimony amounting to \$2,000 and monthly payments of \$200 pending litigation were assessed yesterday by Justice Stafford against J. Henry Clark. This money is to be paid to Mrs. Mary K. Clark, who began divorce proceedings against her husband in November, 1912.

The back alimony covers the period from the filing of the suit until next month. The decree recites that representations have been made to the court that the income of Mr. Clark is \$10,000 annually.

FAMOUS AZTEC CLUB MEETS MONDAY NIGHT

Was Formed During Mexican War in 1847—Gen. Gibson Expected to Attend.

Preparations are being made here for the annual meeting and banquet of the Aztec Club of 1847, the famous organization founded in Mexico City, after its occupation by the American army, which is to be held at the Army and Navy Club Monday evening.

The Aztec Club was formed during the Mexican war by officers of the American army of occupation, its membership at that time being principally young lieutenants who wished to increase the social advantages.

Only men engaged in the Mexican campaign and their nearest relatives are eligible to membership and at all state functions the club ranks second to the Order of the Cincinnati. The club insignia is an enamelled Maltese cross, suspended by a red, white and green ribbon, the Mexican national colors.

The present officers of the club are John W. Polk of New York, president; Gen. Horatio G. Gibson, vice president; William Turnbull of Washington, treasurer; and William Stone Abert of Washington, secretary.

Will Elect New Officers. New officers will be elected this year. The usual custom is not to elect a president, but to have the vice president automatically succeed to the position.

Gen. Gibson, the vice president, actually served in the Mexican campaign. At the banquet of the club last year he made an address which was eagerly listened to by the younger members of the organization. His recollections of events and scenes during the war with Mexico are still vivid. It is expected that he will attend the dinner again this year, despite his advanced age.

REGARD THE MATERIAL AS WELL AS SPIRITUAL. Secretary Wilson Believes Man's Nature Is Entitled to Care in Both Directions.

"It is necessary for us to recognize the material as well as the spiritual nature of man," said Secretary Wilson of the Department of Labor in an address last night at a "men's dinner" at Gunton-Temple Memorial Church, 14th and R streets.

"We must take care of the material in order that we may take care of the spiritual," he declared. "Some cater only to the spiritual. It is true that this is better than to recognize only the material, but in this connection it might be asked what the church has failed to do for the laboring man. The answer is that in many instances it has failed to realize the relation of the material and the spiritual."

What He Hopes to Accomplish. The speaker said it is hoped that the Department of Labor will be able to correlate the two elements of man's nature and through that be able to bring employers and employees to a real brotherhood, and, in addition to that, to a partnership in production.

George A. Prevost was toastmaster. The four degree members, commanded by Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana, Representative R. L. Henry of Texas, Rev. A. J. Donlon, president of Georgetown University, and Edward P. Harrington, Archbishop Giovanni Bonzano, papal delegate, will make the invocation.

Plans for the organization of the proposed National Popular Government League, whose object is to bring about a more popular form of government, were made at a meeting of senators, representatives and others interested in political reform, at the Cosmos Club last night.

The league, it is announced, will support the "getaway amendment" to the Constitution, which would make it easier to amend the Constitution, the direct nomination and election of President and Vice President, initiative and referendum, the recall, direct primary, preferential ballot and other so-called reform measures.
