

ENGLAND MAKES PLANS TO GET ARMY RECRUITS

Authorities Are Seriously Considering a Systematic Advertising Campaign.

In an effort to secure recruits for military service, the British authorities, it is learned, are seriously considering a systematic campaign of advertising, setting forth the attractive side of the service. It is understood that colored posters and advertisements in magazines and newspapers, such as have been used in this country for the same purpose, will be used. These methods of attracting young to the military service of this country have been criticised at times by members of Congress on the ground that the youth of the country was being imposed upon.

The latest order issued by the British authorities provides for the payment of a bonus to enlisted men who wear their uniforms when visiting their homes on leave of absence. The British authorities have come to the conclusion that nothing but advertising, done by halves than advertising. It is suggested that a great campaign should be pursued throughout the country, using newspapers and periodicals simultaneously with mental recruiting marches, tournaments, displays and moving picture performances of military life and historical achievements.

Regiments Come From Districts. Regiments are recruited from certain districts in England, and the fact that they are not recruited to their full strength is to be brought to the attention of those in the districts. It has been the practice to stick up posters and announcements outside police stations and churches in England to attract recruits, but this is not believed to be of any value. It has been suggested that permission be given for enlisted men to wear their uniforms after discharge on the occasions of parades, concerts, dances or ceremonies of an official but unpolitical nature, or even at military weddings.
