

PRESIDENT TO SIGN DEFICIENCY BILL

Exemptions From Civil Service Law Not Regarded as Reason for Veto.

IS WITHIN HIS POWER TO IGNORE PROVISION

Meeting of Cabinet in Sections Today—Administration Declines to Settle Factional Fights.

President Wilson is expected to sign the urgent deficiency bill today. It is upon his desk, and if he does not sign it at once his reason will be that he understood that he was to get further opinions on the provision in that measure exempting certain deputy collectors of internal revenue and customs from the protection of the civil service law.

Cabinet Meets in Sections.

The President had a cabinet meeting in sections today, this being the regular cabinet day. Five of his advisers—Secretaries Lane, Garrison, Houston, Redfield and Postmaster General Burleson—were given from thirty minutes to an hour each for departmental discussion and to present to the President analyses of the items in the estimates of the respective departments for the next fiscal year.

Cotton High; Potatoes Big.

President Wilson today received a huge North Carolina sweet potato, weighing nearly seven pounds. One of his admirers sends it along with assurance that a "southern" department of the potato had the animal bent that potatoes stay lean and hungry until frost falls and the persimmon gets ripe.

Not Settling Fights.

The President and Postmaster General Burleson long ago agreed that they will not make post office nominations where there are fights and contentions. The administration policy is that democratic senators, representatives and other men influential in the making of recommendations must settle their differences and agree on recommendations before expecting patronage.
