The house of deputies at the general convention refused today, by a close vote, to accept a recommendation that a final court of appeals be established to determine questions of doctrine, faith and worship affecting the clergy.

EDDY TRUSTEES NAMED

Six Appointed to Administer \$3,000,000 Fund for Christian Science Church.

CONCORD, N. H., October 18.—The final act in the prolonged litigation over the will of the late Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy was the appointment by Judge Charles R. Corning in the Merrimack county court of probate today of trustees to administer the three-million-dollar fund which Mrs. Eddy left for the promotion and extension of the doctrines of Christian Science, as taught by her.

The trustees appointed are Archibald MacLellan, Allison V. Stewart, John V. Dittmore, Adam H. Dickey and James A. Neal, who constitute the board of directors of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, and Josiah E. Fernald of this city, a banker, who has been the practical custodian of Mrs. Eddy's estate since the establishment of this trust in 1907; the court thus choosing as trustees men in whom Mrs. Eddy's charitable trust is believed to have confidence.

These appointments by Judge Corning were made under a recent decision of the supreme court of New Hampshire, which held that Mrs. Eddy's will established not a local but a worldwide, general charitable trust, to be administered under the general supervision of the courts of New Hampshire.

GIRL HELD FOR MURDER.

Ella Moore Shoots Frank Kelly, Firing Five Shots.

CONCORDIA, Kan., October 18.—Ella Moore, twenty-three years old, was held responsible by a coroner's jury today for the death of Frank Kelly, whom she shot five times and killed as he ran from her last night. The sheriff said she had made a statement in which she admitted she shot Kelly, but charged that he had attacked her twice. After the first attack she said she told county officers, but they refused to act. When the offense was repeated she decided to avenge herself, she said. She is the daughter of Frank Moore, who came here from Oklahoma.
