ECONOMY WAVE IS FELT. Senate Weather Station Combined With That of House.

The wave of economy which sweeps at times over the Capitol has carried away another old Senate institution, at least in its present form.

For many years a first-class weather station has been maintained at the Senate end of the Capitol and another at the House end.

Besides a huge weather map of the United States, barometers, thermometers, waterfalls, and other instruments were maintained at each station, and an employe of the weather bureau was in charge.

But now these instruments have been moved from the Senate station, except the weather map, and one employe will now have charge of both the Senate and House weather stations.

In former days the weather man in charge of the station at the House end kept the watches of the sensors regulated by means of the special chronometer installed in the Senate station for sensors to take their watches to him whenever they seemed to be gaining or losing time.

TWO SUITS DECIDED. Judgments Rendered by the Court of Claims.

THOUSAND MILLION FEET OF LUMBER TO BE SOLD. Secretary Houston Approves Disposal of Pine in Kalab National Forest.

Approximately a thousand million feet of western yellow pine lumber, now growing on the Kalab national forest, in northern Arizona, is to be disposed of by the government, the sale having been approved by Secretary Houston of the Department of Agriculture today.

This timber sale is said to be the largest that has yet been made by the government. The investment necessary to handle the project, it is stated, will be a fraction of the cost of the work of cutting and hauling out the timber, will require about twenty-five years.

In order to get the lumber out, a railroad about 200 miles long will have to be built, it is stated. This road will tap hitherto untouched regions in southern Utah and Colorado, and will afford a rail line from the north into the Grand Canyon of the Colorado river, heretofore accessible only from the south.
