

Building operations in the District of Columbia last month involved a total expenditure of \$1,544,778, according to a report by Building Inspector Morris Hacker. Distribution of improvements in the various sections of the city was as follows: Buildings—North-east, \$20,745; south-east, \$15,780; north-west, \$48,850; south-west, \$12,060; county, \$841,965; totals, \$1,449,235. Repairs, etc.—North-east, \$5,010; south-east, \$3,908; north-west, \$15,106; south-west, \$7,752; county, \$39,617; totals, \$104,793; combined totals, \$1,554,028.
