

LOVERS OF HORSE ARE OUT IN FORCE

Nineteen Events on Second Day's Program of National Capital Show.

SPECTACULAR JUMPING IN THE EARLY EVENTS

Standard Bred Stallions, Heavy Draft Team and Ponies in Harness Exhibited.

Today's Horse Show Program.

Washington lovers of the horse again turned out en masse this afternoon to witness the running off of the second day's program of the National Capital show at 15th and D streets northeast.

Nineteen events, including two left over from Saturday, were scheduled, necessitating the starting of the show at 1 o'clock, an hour earlier than the time announced in the program.

Patrons who arrived early witnessed some spectacular jumping in the first two numbers, the military hunting class, in which there were thirteen entries, and class No. 74, for hunters, which received thirty-five entries.

The best army horses on the grounds and some of the most famous hunters that have ever participated in a local meet competed in these events, the jumping being of a particularly high order.

Draft Teams on Program. Today's program varied from that of Saturday's in that it provided for the exhibition of standard bred stallions, heavy draft teams and ponies in harness. It included the usual number of classes for harness and saddle horses and hunters.

Much interest was taken in class 29, for ponies in harness, in that it served to bring before a Washington audience for the first time the diminutive celebrity of the Churchman stables, Jimmy Tejar, a sports horse, which has been known to defeat in a show ring. Owned by Dr. V. T. Churchman of Charleston, W. Va., this little animal has won twenty-four blue ribbons and three championships out of twenty-seven appearances.

Mrs. Allan Potts of Gordonville, Va., who is a favorite with capital horse audiences, was expected to make a strong bid for honors in the class for ladies' pairs, hunters, in which she entered her first prize, Happy Treck and Pretty Maid. The Glen Riddle and Heartland farms and Home-Home stables had entries in this class.

SAY FEELING GROWS AGAINST HUERTA REGIME

Mexico City Advances Tell of Dictator's Break With Gen. Blaquet.

VERA CRUZ, May 4.—American refugees continue to arrive from the capital and they bring divergent stories of the situation there. Latest arrivals confirm the previous reports of a growing uncertainty of feeling against the Huerta regime, and tell of a rumor of a rupture between Huerta and Gen. Blaquet, minister of war. It was the latter, who the crack 20th Regiment that took the military coup which resulted in the downfall of President Francisco I. Madero.

Feel Change Is Impending.

The resignation of Jose Lopez Portillo y Rojas, the foreign minister, coupled with reports that there is a growing uncertainty of feeling in Mexico City against the Huerta government, is interpreted here as foreshadowing a change in the federal capital.

March Under Blazing Sun.

One marine battalion, ordered to hurry out to El Tejar, made the march under a blazing sun. Another battalion of marines and a battalion of the 4th Infantry were taken forward as quickly as possible to El Tejar, where the patched-up locomotives could take them. At the same time artillery and mounted detachments with machine gun platoon were being hurried forward.

Mexican Soldiers Friendly.

The Mexicans were carrying hundreds of rounds of ammunition. They were friendly and informed the Americans that a troop train had gone out along the other line, and it was in that direction that the battle, if any, must be in progress. The Americans thanked them and retraced their steps to El Tejar.
