

Whitman Victory in New York Is a Landslide; Republicans Gain in Many Doubtful States

WADSWORTH COMES TO SENATE; PENROSE WINS IN PENNSYLVANIA; PROGRESSIVE SHOWING IS WEAK

Ohio Goes Wet By About 40,000--Roger Sullivan Leads in Illinois--"Uncle Joe" Cannon in Front--Massachusetts Probably Has Elected Democrat As Governor--Shively Seemed Defeated.

At 10 o'clock tonight it was evident that Charles S. Whitman, district attorney of New York city, had been elected Governor of New York on the republican ticket by a great majority.

TAMMANY HALL CONCEDES DEFEAT. Tammany Hall conceded the republican victory and estimated a plurality of 150,000 for Whitman in the entire state.

Penrose Is Victorious. In Pennsylvania there seems to be a landslide for Senator Penrose. In Ohio the state has gone "wet" by about 10,000.

Illinois Senator Sherman declares tonight that even if Roger Sullivan was carried Chicago and Cook county, which seems likely, by 80,000, he would still be the winner.

Massachusetts. The Boston Globe declares that Walsh, the democratic candidate, has been elected governor by 12,000.

Shively Running Behind. Senator Shively is reported running behind in Indiana.

Alabama. The Birmingham American, a republican newspaper, says John Walter Smith, general, has been elected to the Senate by Alabama constituents.

Arkansas. Little Rock, Ark., November 2--The entire democratic congressional ticket in Arkansas was elected.

Charles F. Murphy's Comment on Election. NEW YORK, November 3.--Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, said tonight: "My vote the electors of the state have decided their choice for governor. I hope that he may fill the great office as conscientiously and as worthily as his efficient predecessor, Gov. Glynn."

HUGE CROWD SEES ELECTION RETURNS

Mass of Humanity Views Bulletins on The Star's Stereopticon Screen.

MANY FREAK BETS MADE AS RESULTS ARE FLASHED

Through Assembles Early and Proves Very Orderly--Little Enthusiasm Shown.

Washington turned out in large numbers last night to view the returns on The Star stereopticon screen.

That there were many Massachusetts citizens in the crowd was shown by the applause at the early returns from that state showing that the democrats were holding their own.

Post Office Clock on Job. Fortunately, the old post office clock had recovered from the inertia that it had shown in the past.

The crowd was for the most part orderly and not much given to applause. The election of Underwood to the Senate was applauded, as indicating approval in his home territory of the democratic tariff program which is on trial in these elections.

Crowd's Comment Varied. The crowd's comment was varied. An elderly colored man standing by one of the bulletin boards of The Star soliloquized to himself.

"They has to go out an' talk," he said, "and den dey has to sit around all day long in 'n' out whether dey 'ol's de jobs or not. I sho' is wried me."

Two men having crested themselves at a certain place which does not see ice cream soda, drifted out of the front door smacking their lips and wondering what the results indicated.

"Where do you suppose T. Roosevelt is tonight?" inquired the first man.

Around about 8 o'clock a lovely young woman drifted in the corner of the street wearing the arm of her escort.

For a while she remained silent and read such notices as:

BRITISH CRUISER SUNK, ANOTHER LEFT BURNING, BY GERMANS OFF CHILE

Third Warship Bottled Up in Harbor at Coronel--Kaiser's Fleet Uninjured in Battle.

VALPARAISO, Chile, November 3.--The German warships Gneisenau, Scharnhorst, Nurnberg, Leipzig and Dresden today attacked the British fleet off Coronel, Chile.

The British cruiser Glasgow took refuge in the harbor of Coronel and is now bottled up.

The German warships Scharnhorst, Nurnberg and Gneisenau anchored at midday today in Valparaiso harbor uninjured.

BRITISH SUBMARINE SUNK. LONDON, November 3 (9:47 p.m.)--The British submarine D-5 was sunk in the North sea early this morning by a mine which was thrown out by a German cruiser retreating before British cruisers.

Two officers and two men of the submarine were saved. This information is contained in an admiralty report issued here tonight.

Fired Upon Gunboat. The report says a German squadron fired on the British gunboat Halcyon, which was patrolling, wounding one man.

"Various naval movements were made," the report continues, "as a result of which the Germans retreated rapidly, and, although shadowed by British cruisers, did not seem to be brought into a sea action."

"The foremost German cruiser in her retirement threw out a number of mines and the submarine was sunk by one of them."

PEACE ONLY WHEN FOE IS CRUSHED, SAID CZAR

LONDON, November 3, 2:35 p.m.--A dispatch from Moscow to Reuter's Telegram Company says that Emperor Nicholas, in telegraphing his greeting to the Merchants' Association on the occasion of the opening of its session, said:

"Peace only is possible when Russia reaches the heart of German soil. This is the unanimous opinion of all Mesopotamians. Any apprehension of peace being concluded before the enemy is completely crushed is unfounded."

SERVIA HAS SEVERED RELATIONS WITH TURKEY

LONDON, November 3, 8:40 p.m.--A Constantinople dispatch states that Serbia today severed diplomatic relations with Turkey and the Serbian ambassador asked for his passports.

TURKS DETAIN FRENCH AND ENGLISH SUBJECTS. The Turkish minister of war ordered detained a special train bearing British and French subjects from Turkey which Ambassador Morgenthau had arranged Sunday to leave Constantinople.

The minister of war declared that until it is a ten to one bet that the conveyances of numerous hospitals and asylums will be working over time for the next few days.

Turkish Subjects Can Leave. Ambassador Morgenthau called the American government that before the British ambassador left he had given Mr. Morgenthau assurances that all Turkish subjects in the British empire would be permitted to leave.

French Embassy Hears of German Withdrawal. Foreign office dispatches to the French embassy in Washington supplemented the account of the German withdrawal from the south of Bizumda with the statement that "at the end of the day we took up the offensive on our side."

Turkish Vessels Sunk. Mr. Morgenthau's latest dispatch, dated 5 p.m. Sunday, said he had been informed by a member of the Ottoman cabinet of the sinking of two Turkish vessels by the British fleet off the port of Smyrna and of the crossing of Russian troops on the frontier at Erzerum.

FIGHTING IN POLAND CONTINUES, SAYS BERLIN. BERLIN, November 2 (by wireless).--The fighting in Poland continues, but no details of recent engagements are as yet available according to reports reaching here from Vienna.

German Retreating, Belgians Declare. HAVRE, France, November 3, via Paris 2:05 p.m.--An official communication given out by the Belgian general staff and dated November 2, 9:15 p.m., says: "The enemy has fallen back toward the east, abandoning his dead and wounded."
