

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INSURANCE BOARD IS CALLED "TRUST" Ben Johnson Assails Underwriters' Organization in House Speech.

SAYS DISTRICT OFFICIAL ACTED IN ITS INTEREST Representative Upholds Commercial Fire Company Which Opposed Joining.

Chairman Ben Johnson of the House District committee regards the recently formed board of fire underwriters of this city as a "trust" and in a speech on the floor of the House yesterday afternoon claimed that Charles P. Nesbit, superintendent of insurance, had acted in the interests of the so-called "trust" by endeavoring to bring into its folds the Commercial Fire Insurance Company...

Upholds Company.

Mr. Johnson upheld the course of the Commercial Fire Insurance Company throughout his speech, and lauded Robert Tuttle, who was president of that corporation. Acts of Superintendent.
