TO EQUALIZE VALUES OF TAXABLE PROPERTY

Resolution Before Council of Takoma Park, Md., for Changing Assessments.

The introduction of a resolution in-
structing the board of assessors to
change the proportion of assessments
on improved and unimproved prop-
erty within the corporate limits of Takoma
Park, Md., from the present basis of
one-third full value on improved and
two-thirds on unimproved to one-fourth
and three-fourths, respectively, caused
a long discussion at a meeting of the
town council last night.

Objects to Consideration.
Councilman L. R. Gr. all objected to
the consideration of the motion on the
ground that the council was not suffi-
ciently informed on the idea to act in-
telligently and that a passage would
have a tendency to disturb real estate
values. He also opposed the resolu-
tion on the ground that it would make
the town's revenues uncertain and
visionary.

Half Day Granted to Veterans and Relatives in Federal Employ.

The President has directed that all
war veterans and the relatives of vic-
tims of the battleship Maine at gov-
ernment employ who desire to attend
the Maine memorial exercises at the
Arlington cemetery Monday be excused
from their duties at noon of that day.

Resignation Announced.
It was announced at the meeting last
night that E. E. Blodgett, who has
been a member of the council for the
last thirteen years, had resigned to ac-
cept the position of superintendent of
public works, a new position recently
created by the council. His successor
will be elected in May.

W. D. McLEAN HONORED.
Former Washingtonian Heads New York Banking Company.

Wallace Donald McLean, formerly of
this city, has been elected general man-
ager of the Morris Plan Banking Com-
pany of New York, and will be in
charge of its fifteen banking houses
there.

Mr. McLean was a resident of this
city until March, 1913, when he was
appointed to an important position in
the United States Express Company in
New York, which he held until re-
cently. He is a Princeton graduate,
and studied law at Columbian Uni-
versity, graduating in 1898. At one
time he served as chairman of the dis-
tribution committee of the republican
national committee, with offices in
Chicago. He was one of the incorpor-
ators of the governing board of the Uni-
versity Club of this city.

HERBERT DEICHES DEAD.
Baltimore Merchant Stricken as He Talks to Doctor by Telephone.

Word has been received in this city
of the death Sunday morning in Bal-
timore of Herbert Deiches, a member
of the wholesale firm of William Deiches
& Sons.

He was stricken with heart disease in
the midst of a telephone conversation
with his physician, and the doctor did
not at first realize what had happened.
Funeral services will be held in Bal-
timore tomorrow. His wife and two
small children and two brothers—Wil-
liam Deiches and Milton Deiches—sur-
vive him.
