
HOLLAND AN EXAMPLE TO WARRING NATIONS

Increase of Clerks' Salaries.

To the Editor of The Star: Permit me the use of your valuable space to call attention to a simple but pertinent question. For many years a host of living has risen out of all proportion to the salaries of the majority of wage earners, thus seriously affecting the mode of living and comfort in general of many people. It has produced deprivation of all sorts, and in the discontent and misery. When we consider the compensation of wage earners we must concede that it has been improved throughout the country from time to time, until there is a marked increase in the salaries of many. But what has the government done for its employees during all these years of higher cost of living? It may be true that a small part of the clerks have had their salaries raised, but what about the rest? The average salary of the government clerks is not much over \$1,000. How can they afford to live with any kind of comfort, particularly with a family, under the circumstances? The result is that many are resorting to borrowing money at a high interest. This keeps them constantly in debt. The government should be raised to a wage commensurate with his living expenses. He could then pay his debts and the government would gain instead of lose.
