ADMIRAL DEWA GIVES FAREWELL DINNER HERE

Entertains in Honor of High Officials of Washington Government and Citizens. Japan's Representative to Panama-Pacific Exposition Leaves Monday for New York.

Baron Dewa, vice admiral of the Japanese navy, who is Japan's official representative to the Panama-Pacific exposition, entertained at a farewell dinner last night in honor of high officials of the Washington government and citizens whom he has met since he came to Washington a week ago for a visit.

The dinner was given at the Shoreham, and toasts were drunk to the Japanese emperor and President Wilson, Secretary Bryan proposing the first and Baron Dewa the second.

Baron Dewa's Remarks. Admiral Dewa said: "We understand our positions and the friendly feeling which exists between your country and mine. Permit me, excellencies and gentlemen, to express the hope that you will visit my country."

W.C.A. ADDS 36 TODAY TO MEMBERSHIP ROLL

"Aeroplanes" Have Obtained Near Twice as Many Names as "Automobiles." With the enrollment today of thirty-six new members, the total number of members brought into the Young Women's Christian Association during the membership campaign reached 112. Again today the "aeroplanes" brought in the larger number, their score being twenty-two as against fourteen brought in by the "automobiles."

Plans for Reception. Tacks for Members. If the member is brought in by one of the teams from the automobiles a tack with a red head is placed on the map, while a blue-headed tack is used if the member is brought in by an aeroplane.

A large number of states already have tacks in them, but it is believed that by the end of the campaign, one week from tomorrow night, every state will be so marked. Also, it is anticipated that a number of foreign states will be represented.

LAST OF THREE ALLEGED DYNAMITERS IS ARRESTED

David Caplan Taken Into Custody Near Seattle—Faces Murder Charge. SEATTLE, Wash., February 19.—David Caplan, wanted by the Los Angeles authorities in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building, was arrested last night on Bainbridge Island, a few miles from Seattle, according to a telephone message from Walter R. Thayer, manager of the Seattle branch of a national detective bureau.

Follows Arrest of Schmidt. LOS ANGELES, Cal., February 19.—The arrest of David Caplan follows closely the arrest in New York of M. A. Schmidt, who, with Caplan and James B. McNamara, now in prison, were indicted for murder in connection with the destruction of the Los Angeles Times building by dynamite on October 19, 1910, and the loss of twenty-one lives. Caplan is accused of having accompanied Schmidt and James B. McNamara on their trip to Seattle, where they worked near Richmond, Cal., where, it is alleged, they bought a large quantity of dynamite. The dynamite, it is said, was used in blowing up the Times building.

NORTH CAROLINA THEME OF DINNER SPEAKERS

Secretary Daniels Asserts and "Proves" the Commonwealth Rules the Union. Similar Eulogies by Others at Annual Function Given by State Society. The state of North Carolina runs the United States. At least such seemed the opinion of Secretary Joseph Daniels, of the Navy, speaking in humorous vein at the annual dinner of the North Carolina Society, held at Rauscher's last night. Earlier in the evening P. D. Gold had told of the many eminent North Carolinians "away from home," referring to the three Presidents, two Vice Presidents and eight members of the cabinet who had been born in that state. But it remained for the Secretary of the Navy, standing beneath the anchor-decorated flag of his office, to cap the climax.

Mr. Mann's Warning. "At this time," said Representative Mann, "it is absolutely necessary that the House and the people of the country place their reliance in the President of the United States. It would be a serious thing for the Congress, without all of the information which is available to the President, to interfere in the foreign relations of the country." "Woodrow Wilson is President. He was elected President by the people. We must trust him in these matters and we must not endeavor to annoy, hamper or interfere with him."

Faith in Administration Urged. "I believe he is anxious to preserve the rights of this country and to preserve peace. I hope we will be able to profit our rights and to preserve peace. The only thing we can do under the circumstances is to have faith in the administration." Representative Flood declared "that it is no time for this country to pry into the troubles of other countries and Japan, if there are any such troubles." The same position was taken by Representative Kent of California, who asserted that "we ought not attempt to establish and maintain a Monroe doctrine in the far east."

Reason for Gratitude. Representative R. N. Page contributed to the merriment of the evening by saying: "When the gavel falls on the 14th of March, and this Congress enters into the things that were, a great shout of joy will go forth from the ocean to the mountains.
