


SUMMER HOME OF THE CHRIST CHILD SOCIETY.



HOME IN COUNTRY FOR CITY CHILDREN

Achievement of the Christ Child in Its Silver Jubilee Year.

FARM OF THIRTEEN ACRES NEAR SILVER SPRING, MD.

Reception Is to Be Celebrated at Annual Meeting of the Society Tomorrow.

The Christ Child Society is to celebrate its silver jubilee at the twenty-fifth annual meeting tomorrow afternoon at Rameyers.

The society has been greatly handicapped in past seasons by not having a permanent home to which to send needy and ailing children.

For several years a place in the country, convenient of access to Washington, has been rented, and the little charges of the society given a new week outing, and where the necessity was urgent, a much longer stay, at the home.

The farmhouse rented by the society for the two summers past having proved well adapted for the needs of the work, has been purchased and a first payment made, and, as the amount still due will have to be raised by voluntary contributions and other ways by the members, arrangements were made for the balance on easy terms.

Women Collected Money. The money already paid was collected by women in the organization, who earned it in various ways.

Another gave a lawn fete, and various other means were devised by them to get the money. The home consists of an old-fashioned farmhouse, situated between Silver Spring and Forest Glen, Md.

Thirteen acres of land, with a small stream running through the middle of it, in which the youngsters can wade and frolic, an orchard on one side of the house, and lawn and shade trees in abundance, presents a beautiful vista.

The entire second story of the house is made into three dormitories, large and airy, one of them having as many as five or six windows, and each child having his own little cot, the place affording sleeping accommodations for about twenty-two.

A child as young as four years is taken, if there be an older sister to go along.

Likewise, the society does not refuse children over twelve years of age, as it is often found that children from twelve to fourteen years and older need the outing more than the younger ones, being worn out by care, work and duties beyond their years.

Farm Is Well Stocked.

Downstairs there is a large living and playroom and a spacious dining room, with kitchen adjoining. The farm is well stocked with chickens, ducks and pigeons and the orchard last year yielded an ample supply of fruit.

A man will be built in the brook at one point so as to make a swimming pool, and croquet, swings, see-saws, hammocks, "Kelly-slides" and tents, where the girls play "keeping house" and mother their dolls, furnish a variety of amusements.

The boys have their innings alternately with the girls two weeks at a time and the amusements vary a little in character, base ball naturally holding first place with these enthusiastic young men.

A nation is constantly with the children and brings them back to their homes at the close of their stay at the home. These little guests of the home are required to bring no clothing except the garments they are wearing for the trip, as the Christ Child Society furnishes a fresh-air wardrobe, simple in character, but having everything necessary for the health and comfort of the children.

One of the chief joys of the children is the method of transportation to and from the railroad station and to and from church Sundays, the trip on such occasions being made in a bus wagon with the children seated on beds of straw.

Each season it has been necessary to deny many needy children because of lack of funds. The cost of keeping one child at the home for two weeks is \$5.

Write of Good Times.

The following letter from one of last year's guests at the home, gives an account of the writer's entire day: "I have enjoyed myself very much and hope I will be able to come out next summer. I will tell you what I do in the day. I get up at half-past six and have a fine time swinging with two other girls. In the morning Miss reads us a story, which is very amusing; one story was about 'Black Beauty'. At 11 o'clock I wash my face and hands, so I will be ready for dinner. We have a fine country dinner at 12 o'clock. After dinner all the girls and I try to take a nap so we can go in bathing. In the night, at 8 o'clock, we say our prayers."


