

ANNUAL DINNER PLANS OF G. W. U. LAW SCHOOL

Fiftieth Anniversary of Its Founding to Be Celebrated Saturday Evening.

Plans for the annual dinner of the law school of George Washington University, which this year will mark the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of that school, are being rapidly completed. It is to be held at 7:30 o'clock Saturday evening at Rauscher's. Because of the fact that this year marks the attainment of the half-century point by the school, greater interest even than usual is being taken in the event. It is anticipated that a large number of students, alumni and members of the faculty of other branches of the university as well as of the school itself will be present.

Speakers for the occasion are to be John W. Davis, solicitor general of the United States; Chief Justice Walter Clark of the supreme court of North Carolina; a graduate of the law school in the class of '59; Rear Admiral Charles H. Stockton, president of the alumni association of the law school; and Shurtzoff P. Davis, president of the class who will be speaker for the student body.

The Secretary of War has accepted an invitation to be the guest of honor. An invitation has also been extended to John Garland Pollard of the class of '22, now attorney general of Virginia.

Prof. Fraser to Be Toastmaster.

Prof. Everett Fraser, dean of the law school, is to act as toastmaster. In addition to the addresses several "skits" have been prepared by the students.

An open meeting of the Alumni Association is to be held at the University Club Friday evening. This is to take the form of a reunion and dinner. Individual class reunions are to be held at this time. Arrangements for this event are being made by an executive committee and a committee of fifty representing every class from 1865 to 1915, inclusive.

The George Washington University Law School was first organized in 1826, four years after the incorporation of the institution as the Columbian College. It was soon discontinued, however, and it was not until 1865 that it was re-established. Since then it has been in continuous existence, thus being the oldest law school in the District. Since 1865 the school has conferred degrees on more than 2,000 persons.

Original Location.

Its original location was on 5th street in the Columbian building, the present site of the Columbian college building. Some years later there was erected for it a new building on the present site of the Woodward building. It now occupies, and has for the past four years, the entire fifth and sixth floors of the New Masonic Temple.

The history of the school during the half century of its existence has been one of growth in all lines. The school began with a course extending over two years; it had two instructors, one for the senior and one for the junior class; its classes met for a one-hour session on three evenings in the week. Today its course covers three years of study; its faculty consists of fifteen professors and instructors, six of whom devote their entire time to teaching; its classes meet every day in the morning and late afternoon. The resident members of the faculty have charge of courses in substantive law while prominent members of the local bar give the instruction in practice courses.

Charter Member of Association.

In method of instruction and in scholastic requirements, both for admission and for graduation, the school has kept abreast of the best law schools of the country. It is a charter member of the Association of American Law Schools, whose program consists of the forty-six leading law schools of the country, and whose policy is improvement in methods and standards of legal education. It is the only law school in the District that is a member of this association.

Sunday School Teachers Meet.

The Washington Elementary Graded Sunday School Teachers' Union met with the Brookland Baptist Church Friday night, twenty-three Sunday schools being represented, with 194 delegates present.

Mrs. Washington Topham presided and prayer was read by Rev. H. W. O. Millington. Those who spoke on various phases of church work included Mrs. Esther Woodward, Mrs. H. B. Moulton and Mrs. John E. Lawson.

RE-ELECT MRS. HOWARD HEAD OF ASSOCIATION

Annual Meeting of National Mary Washington Memorial Organization Is Held.

Mrs. Eleanor Washington Howard of Alexandria was re-elected president of the National Mary Washington Memorial Association at the annual meeting held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Virginia room of Memorial Continental Hall. This meeting was one of the last activities in which members of the D. A. R. participated before the closing of the twenty-fourth congress. All the other officers were re-elected.

The report of Senator Blair Lee, treasurer of the association, showed the finances of the association to be in good condition. As neither Senator Lee or Miss Minnie Minkley, secretary of the society, were present, their reports were read for them.

Includes 600 American Women.

The official list of the association contains the names of 600 American women as honorary members, and a directory of these is being compiled, it was announced.

The association, being organized for perpetuity, the life members and their successors by inheritance, called "inheritors," are privileged to add in caring for the protection and preservation of the grave and monument of the mother of Washington for all future time.

The medals or insignia of the association are in inheritance to descend from mother to daughter or granddaughter, and so on in the direct female line, or falling those, by will or deed, and entitle the inheritor to a vote at all meetings of the association.

WAR PICTURES TO BE SHOWN.

Some idea of the magnitude of these pictures may be gained from the fact that the 8,000 feet of film to be shown has been selected from 82,000 feet made at a cost said to be close to \$200,000. Both the armies and navies of the battling nations will be depicted.


