STEPS TAKEN TO FORM MENTAL HYGIENE BODY

District Committee Will Be Part of National Organization. Meeting Held.

Preliminary steps were taken at a meeting in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon for the formation in the District of Columbia of a committee on mental hygiene, to be a local branch of the national committee for mental hygiene, which has headquarters in New York.

At yesterday's meeting, which was called by the Washington committee on mental and nervous diseases, the nucleus of a permanent committee on organization was named, consisting of Surgeon General Rupert Blue, Miss Julia C. Lathrop, head of the Federal children's bureau; Dr. William A. White, superintendent of the Government Hospital for the Insane; Dr. Percy Hocking and Dr. Frank Leech. The first three of these are local members of the national committee.

The committee was empowered to proceed with plans for the organization in Washington of a local branch of the national organization, and to name additional members to co-operate in the organization work. The next meeting is to be held in the fall, at a date to be announced later.

Tells of Experiences.

Dr. Tom A. Williams presided at yesterday's meeting, which was addressed at some length by Clifford W. Beers, founder of the national committee. Mr. Beers was induced to take up the work of organizing such a national committee by reason of his own experiences while suffering from a form of insanity brought about by nervous collapse. On making complete a recovery from the mental malady Mr. Beers was able to remember all that had transpired in the years leading up to the collapse, as well as during the period while the mental affliction existed, and his recollections of the treatment accorded him determined him to devote his life to a study of laws governing the care of the insane; the manner of commitment in the different states; provision for the care of various types of insane persons, and the care of feeble-minded

youths and adults. His experience has had its fruition in the organization of the committee for mental hygiene, which is now organized in seven states of the Union.

Promises Co-Operation.

At yesterday afternoon's meeting Dr. William C. Woodward, District health officer, promised a hearty co-operation of the department of which he is the head in the effort to bring about better conditions and more humane laws in regard to handling and caring for the insane and feeble-minded of the District of Columbia.

Dr. Woodward also expressed the deep interest of Commissioner Brownlow in the organization of the local committee, and speaking for the Commissioner, promised the hearty co-operation in the movement of the heads of the District government.

Would Drop Party Bosses.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 28.—Party bosses should be dropped as "obsolete institutions" and the Governor of New York made the party leader in the state, Jacob Gould Schurman, president of Cornell University, and one of the vice presidents of the constitutional convention, declared in an address before the Unconditional Republican Club here last night. Adopting the short ballot, transferring the executive power to legislative legislation, will make him the controlling influence, he continued. He declared his belief that the constitutional convention now sitting will arm the governor with these powers.
